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☆ **LOAD OPTIMIZED DEFAULTS**

“LOAD OPTIMIZED DEFAULTS” will have the BIOS default settings loaded into the CMOS memory. These default settings will optimize system performance and system stability. Load the setup default is recommended when you receive this mainboard or when the system CMOS data is corrupted. Refer to Section 4.12 for the procedures.

☆ **DISCHARGE CMOS DATA**

Whenever you want to discharge the CMOS data or open the system chassis, Make sure to disconnect the AC power first because there is always the 5V standby voltage active in the PC system. Without disconnecting the AC power connector from the PC system, the mainboard can be damaged by improper operation .

☆ **WAKE ON LAN**

In order to support the onboard Wake On LAN feature, the system requires a special Switching Power Supply, Such power supply must be able to provide at least 1A of driving capability on the “5V standby” voltage.

☆ **WARNING !**

The "Static Electricity" may cause damage to the components on the mainboard, In order to avoid the damage to the mainboard accidentally, please discharge all static electricity from your body before touching this mainboard.

IMPORTANT NOTICE:

This mainboard supports the ACPI function and there is the standby voltage always active all the time. (when the system power is off, there is still the standby voltage active scanning the wake up event) Whenever you are installing any component onto the mainboard.

- BE SURE TO DISCONNECT THE POWER CABLE.

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 OVERVIEW

This Mainboard is a high performance personal computer mainboard. Intel® i815 chipset is chosen as the core logic of the mainboard to give the most outstanding performance and reliability. It is the Micro-ATX form-factor with Socket 370 designed on the board for Pentium™ !!! processor.

Intel® i815 chipset is a high integration, high performance, power-efficient and high compatibility device which supports Intel and non-Intel processors to PCI bridge functionality for the complete PC99-compliant PCI system. The Intel® i815 chipset provides two channels of "PIO" and "Ultra DMA33/66 Bus Master" mode PCI IDE ports to support the most updated Ultra DMA 66 HDD. There are one Floppy Disk controller, two high speed Serial ports (UARTs), one multi-mode Parallel port, one PS/2™ mouse port, one IR interface and two USB ports (815TM5 supports up to five USB ports) designed on the board for wide variety of peripheral connection.

According to the requirement from different customers, this mainboard will have different feature as shown in the following table:

There are the 3D PCI audio and AGP VGA interfaces built on the board. These onboard interfaces are the PnP devices (Plug and Play) and they are fully compatible with the Windows environment. So you don't have to purchase another sound card or VGA card because the onboard interface will meet your multimedia requirement. (Please refer to Section 3-5 for the installation of the device driver for the onboard audio and VGA interfaces.)

Note: Pentium™ !!! processor is the 32-bit processor with RISC technology, which offers several key features such as built-in L2 cache, 12-stage super-pipeline architecture, out of order execution ... etc. In order to optimize of its capabilities and performances, the 32-bit Operating System (such as Windows 95®, Windows 98®, Windows NT® and OS/2™ ...etc.) and 32-bit applications are recommended.

1.2 AIR BUS -

There is a new interface designed on this mainboard - the AIR Bus (CN25). The AIR Bus is designed on the mainboard which will give many amazing features to the PC system. One of the most significant and immediate feature from the AIR Bus is the "Portable BIOS™" device. The Portable BIOS™ is an intelligent device which can be connect to the AIR Bus and it will rescue the system BIOS from virus attack and BIOS data lost.

Why AIR Bus?

Most modern mainboards use the flash ROM as the storage device to store the system BIOS. Since the flash ROM is the programmable device and the data stored in the flash ROM can be destroyed easily. Before we start to introduce how AIR bus works in your PC system, please refer to the following for the potential risk which you may found with the programmable flash ROM:

1. SYSTEM BIOS CAN BE KILLED BY VIRUS

There was a virus called CIH virus and it made users start to aware that the virus could also make serious damage to the mainboard. Such virus will kill the system BIOS and make PC system failed to work. Unfortunately, there is no perfect anti-virus software which will prevent the system BIOS from virus attack. Once the system BIOS is killed by the virus, you will be unable to start up the PC system. There is nothing you can do about it, except send the PC system to the supplier for troubleshooting.

2. THE RISK IS HUGE WHILE UPGRADING THE SYSTEM BIOS

In case there is the power break or system hangs while you are upgrading the system BIOS, you will have a incomplete system BIOS in your mainboard because only part of the new system BIOS was written into the flash ROM. Of course, you won't be able to use the PC system any more. Same as what mentioned above, you have to send the PC system to the supplier for troubleshooting.

3. WRONG BIOS CAN CAUSE SERIOUS TROUBLE

When you feel like to have the system BIOS got updated, you may have to visit the web page of the supplier. There are so many different system BIOS included there in the web page and you may choose the wrong one. Obviously, you will be in a deep trouble if you are using wrong BIOS to update the system BIOS. Whenever you are down loading the system BIOS from the web page, be sure to double check that you are choosing the correct one. Otherwise, you will find the PC system fail to work when you have the wrong BIOS written into the flash ROM on the mainboard.

4. FAULTY FLASH ROM MAKES PC SYSTEM FAILED TO WORK

The flash ROM is the programmable device and it has the life cycle. Defective flash ROM does not occur very often. However, once you get a defect flash ROM, you definitely won't be able to use the PC system any more. Since such problem can not be covered by online support, so what you can do is send the PC system to the supplier for troubleshooting and then keep waiting.

Most users know how important the BIOS to a PC system. But it can be easy destroyed because of virus attack or improper handling. Once it is damaged, there is no way to get the PC system back to work except send the PC system back to the supplier for troubleshooting. The system BIOS is so important yet fragile and there seems no perfect protection to the flash ROM. In order to provide a total solution to the system BIOS, the AIR Bus is introduced on the mainboard and it will have the system BIOS recovered from what was mentioned above.

How does the AIR Bus works in the PC system?

The outlook of the AIR Bus is somewhat similar to some of the connection interfaces on the mainboard. However, there is the priority switching technology designed on the interface and that make the AIR Bus special. Different kind of module can be connected to the AIR Bus and give different function to the PC system. One of the most significant function designed for the AIR Bus is the - Portable BIOS™. Basically, there is the spare copy of the system BIOS stored in the Portable BIOS™ and you can use it to rescue system BIOS from different degree of damage. Please refer to the following description and see how the Portable BIOS™ will rescue the system BIOS from damage:

1: SYSTEM BIOS ATTACKED BY VIRUS:

Some virus such CIH will kill the system BIOS and make you unable to start your PC system. There is no perfect prevention to such virus attack because there is new virus invented everyday. Portable BIOS™ can not be used to prevent virus attack. However, you can always use the Portable BIOS™ to rescue the system BIOS from virus attack. Users can have the spare copy of the system BIOS stored on the Portable BIOS™. Whenever there is the virus kill the system BIOS. Simply have the Portable BIOS™ connected to the AIR Bus interface and then turn on the power, There is the intelligent software in the Portable BIOS™ and it will recover the system BIOS instantly.

2: POWER BREAK OR SYSTEM HANGS WHILE BIOS IS UPDATING:

Under such circumstance, the system BIOS written into the flash ROM is not complete and you could not use it to start the PC system. Such problem is very similar to the virus attack. So you can use the Portable BIOS™ to have the system BIOS recovered. Same as what is mentioned above, have the Portable BIOS™ connected to the AIR Bus and then power on the PC system. Portable BIOS™ will recover the system BIOS immediately. With the Portable BIOS™ on your hand, you may always feel free to upgrade the system without the potential concern.

3: WRONG BIOS WAS WRITTEN INTO THE FLASH ROM:

If you are lucky enough, you still can start the PC system and down load the correct one from the internet and update the system BIOS. However, you may find that the PC system does not work at all when you have updated the PC system with wrong system BIOS. Under such circumstance, you can use the Portable BIOS™ and have the system BIOS recovered instantly.

4: THE FLASH ROM ON THE BOARD IS FAULTY:

If the flash ROM on the mainboard is faulty, users have to send the PC system (or mainboard) to the supplier for troubleshooting. It can be time and money consuming because most PC dealer can not handle such problem. However, if there is the AIR Bus on the mainboard, users need not to ask for the technical support. Change the Portable BIOS™ to the “master mode” and then have it connected to the AIR Bus. When you power on the PC system, Portable BIOS™ will replace the onboard system BIOS and use the spare copy of system BIOS on the Portable BIOS™ to start the PC system.


5: DO YOU NEED TO HAVE A PORTABLE BIOS™ AT YOUR HAND?


Yes and No. Of course, you can use the Portable BIOS™ to rescue the system BIOS immediately whenever there is the problem found in your system BIOS. However, if you do not have the Portable BIOS™ at your hand, you can always get the immediate support from your dealer. Because the Portable BIOS™ is such a simple device and your dealer will surely know how to use the Portable BIOS™ to rescue your system BIOS. With the AIR Bus on the mainboard, you don't have to wait for a long time before the PC system can get repaired.

According to what was mentioned above, you can easily find that there are so many potential damages which can be happened to your system BIOS and make you unable to use the PC system any more. Obviously, AIR Bus is the best solution because it will rescue your system BIOS from all kind of damages. It is easy to use and effective. With the AIR Bus interface designed on the board, plus the Portable BIOS™ recovering

capability, you will be free from the potential nightmare.

1.3 MAINBOARD LAYOUT





IMPORTANT NOTICE:

There is the 3D audio interface on the board., Please check the CODEC chip (U12) as shown in the above diagram and then choose the proper directory in the CD to install the device driver properly. (please refer to Section 3-5)

*(note: CODEC comes from **compression/decompression** and **coder/decoder**. Codec is the technology which is designed to take care of the data conversion for the onboard audio interface. In order to make the audio interface working properly, you have to install the device driver is properly).*

1. Microsoft PC99 compliant, fully supports S0, S1, and S5 system operating status
2. System resumes by Panel-switch, Keyboard, PS/2 Mouse, Modem ring-in, Phone ring-in ,LAN signal etc.
3. One LED onboard for system operating status indicating the S5 suspend status.

⊙ WOL PORTS

One WOL connector supports Wake-On-LAN (WOL up-designed)

⊙ SB-LINK PORTS (Optional)

One SB-LINK feature connector to support PCI sound cards. (such as Creative™ Labs EMU8008 sound chip)

⊙ USB PORTS (Universal Serial Bus)

815TM : Two USB ports,
815TM5: Five USB ports.

⊙ IDE PORTS

Two channels of Ultra DMA/33 or Ultra DMA/66 Bus Master IDE ports, which will support up to 4 IDE devices like IDE hard disk, ATAPI CD-ROM and LS-120/ZIP-100 devices. The IDE ports can be programmed to support PIO Mode 4, DMA mode 2 and Ultra DMA/33/66.

One Chassis intrusion detection connector. (optional)

◎ HARDWARE MONITORING (optional)

Winbond W83627HF is designed on the board to monitor hardware healthy status like system voltage, system temperature, and cooling fans. (When W83627F is installed on the board, then there will be no hardware monitoring feature on the mainboard. please refer to U5 on page 1-5) The hardware monitoring is a useful feature for the modern PC system. For example, when the CPU temperature is too high, the system BIOS will tell the system board to give a series of beeping alarm and slow down the CPU speed (throttling speed) so that you can take proper action to prevent your system from damage. When you hear the beeping alarm, turn the power off and check on the mainboard components to see whether it is working properly or not. If you don't know how to handle it, send the PC system to your dealer for technical support.

There is the hardware monitoring program in the CD which comes with this mainboard. You can use it to monitor the system healthy status. When you find there is the W83627HF installed on U5, you can install the hardware monitoring program so that it will monitor the system healthy status all the time.

◎ OPERATION SYSTEM

This mainboard is compatible with the operation system such as MS-DOS, Windows NT, OS/2, NOVELL, Windows 95, Windows 98,etc.

2. INSTALLATION

2.1 UNPACKING

The mainboard contains the following components. Please inspect the following contents and confirm that everything is there in the package. If anything is missing or damaged, call your supplier for instructions before proceeding.

- This mainboard.
- One USER'S MANUAL.
- One Cable set for IDE and Floppy devices.
- One CD diskette for device driver and utility program.
- The Virtual Drive included in the CD as a free gift. The Virtual Drive is a very powerful tool which will allow you to make the duplication CD titles.
- The Stop Virus anti-virus software is included in the CD as a free gift

This mainboard contains electrostatic sensitive components and it can be easily damaged by static electricity. So please leave it sealed in the original packing until when installing.

A grounded anti-static mat is recommended when unpacking and installation. Please also attach an anti static wristband to your wrist and have it grounded to the same point as the anti-static mat.

After the opening of the mainboard carton, please observe the mainboard carefully to make sure there is no shipping and handling damage before you can start to install the PC system.

Having finished all the procedures above, you are now ready to install the mainboard to the chassis. Please make sure that the chassis is the ATX or Micro-ATX type so that the mounting hole will match with this mainboard.



IMPORTANT NOTICE:

The standby voltage is always active. Whenever you are installing any component on the mainboard.

- BE SURE TO DISCONNECT THE POWER CABLE.

2.2 AMAZING WAYS TO POWER ON THE PC SYSTEM

This mainboard has the ACPI (Advanced Configuration Power Interface) designed on the board. When the mainboard has the ATX type power supply connected, there are several ways to power on the system. Please read the following description for all the details.

□ POWER BUTTON

The power button can be programmed by COMS setup program and it has different features. Please refer to page 3-20 for detail function description.

□ KEYBOARD (PASSWORD OR HOT KEY)

This mainboard allows you to use your personal password or a combination of hot key to power on your PC system. When the jumper setting on JP1 is “Enabled”, the keyboard OnNow function will be activated. Under this circumstance, this mainboard will keep scanning the keyboard status waiting for the correct password or hot key input even when the system power is off (the stand-by 5V is still working and the power LED on the keyboard is still active). When you have selected the keyboard hot key to power on the PC system, you will be able to use keyboard hot key to power on the PC system. (you can use the power button to power on the PC system all the time.) (Please refer to Section 4.7.- "**Integrated Peripherals**")

When the “Password” and “Hot KEY” is selected, you will have to reboot the PC system to activate the setting, when you see the POST (Power On Self Test) is completed, the setting is changed and stored in the CMOS memory. Having finished the procedure, you may turn the power off and then you can use the keyboard to power-on the PC system afterward.

In case that you forget the “Password” or “Hot Key”, please refer to the jumper setting of JP9 in Section 3-4 and use JP9 to clear the Power On password setting. When Power On password is cleared by JP9, you can use the power button on the front panel to power on the PC system again.

□ PS/2™ MOUSE (LEFT OR RIGHT MOUSE BUTTON)

If you have a PS/2™ mouse connected to the system, you may change the setup in the BIOS and use the mouse click to turn on the PC system power. Please refer to section 4.7 for the BIOS setting

To use the mouse key to turn on the PC system power, the mouse click must be done quickly and continually. Basically, 2-5 quick clicks on the mouse key (left key or right key) will turn the power immediately.

In order to activate the mouse key feature, you will have to reboot the PC system after the BIOS setting and wait until the POST (Power On Self Test) is completed. Having finished the procedure, you may use the mouse key to power-on the PC system afterward..

*Note: 1. This feature is not available on the COM port mouse (serial mouse).
2. To use the PS/2 mouse power-on the PC system, JP1 must be "Enabled"*

□ RTC ALARM

PC system can be waked up by the RTC setting in the CMOS. You can set the alarming date and time in the RTC memory, When RTC alarms, the PC system will be triggered and wakes up automatically on the date and time which you selected in the BIOS setup program.

Enable the “Resume by Alarm” selection in the BIOS setup utility, and then you will see the input request for the date and time. (“Resume by Alarm” is located in the “POWER MANAGEMENT SETUP”, please refer to Section 4.8), When you have stored the RTC alarm setting, the PC system will be turned on automatically according to the date and time which is recorded in the CMOS memory.

□ MODEM RING-IN

Everyone knows that a PC system can be used as a fax machine to send or receive fax messages. But most people still use fax machine to receive their messages because it is not practical to have the system powered on all day long waiting for the incoming messages. Now the problem can be solved because this mainboard can be triggered by a modem ring-in signal.

When you have an *external* modem installed, you can leave the PC system power off. Whenever there is the incoming message, the PC system will be triggered by the ring-in signal and wake up automatically to receive the message for you. From now on, you can tell your PC system to receive the fax message for you.

In order to use the ring-in signal to wake up your PC system, you will have to use the **EXTERNAL MODEM** and have it connected to one of the **SERIAL PORTS** (COM1 or COM2) on the mainboard. When the mainboard detects the ring-in signal from the serial port, the system power will be turned on and start to receive the incoming messages automatically. (you need to have the software like Award Zero-Volt Data-Suspend Utility so that you can use the fax utility to receive the incoming fax message). To enable the Modem Ring-In feature, you have to run the BIOS setup utility and enable the “Power On by Ring / LAN” option (please refer to Section 4.8 for the settings).

Note: *This function is not available when using the internal MODEM card.*

WAKE ON LAN (WOL)

There is a WOL connector CN16 on the mainboard which is designed to connect to the signal from a LAN card which supports the Wake On LAN feature. When such LAN card is installed, you may turn on the PC system from the remote server and monitor the PC status. To enable this feature, you will have to use the BIOS setup utility to enable the “Resume by Ring or LAN” in the BIOS setup program.

Note: *This function will be disabled if you turn off the power before the system can verify the DMI pool data.*

2.3 POWER OFF THE PC SYSTEM

There are two ways to power off the system. They are “Shut Down by Power Button” and “Shut Down by OS”. (such as Windows® 95 and Windows® 98, you can choose the **Shut Down** from the file menu and the system will be powered off immediately).

IMPORTANT NOTICE:

“Shut down by O/S” is always recommended because “Shut Down by Power Button” may cause data lost of wrong configuration problem. Unless your system hangs and you can not use the “Shut down by O/S” to power off the PC system, please do not use the power button on the front panel to power off the PC system.




3. HARDWARE SETUP

Before you can start to install this mainboard, some hardware settings is required to make sure it will work perfectly with the devices which you are going to install in your PC system. To configure the mainboard is a simple task, only a few jumpers, connectors, cables and sockets needs to be selected and configured. (please refer to page 1-5 to see the mainboard layout)

The following connectors labeled with “optional” means they are the optional choice for customers and the related components are normally not populated on the mainboard.

3.1 INSTALLATION OF CPU


There is the Socket 370 CPU connector on the mainboard which is designed for Pentium™ !!! processor. Refer to the following diagram for the CPU socket:





When you have installed the processor onto the mainboard, it will detect the CPU type and decide the CPU voltage automatically. So you don't have to make any jumper setting to select the CPU voltage and CPU FSB clock. All you have to do is use the BIOS setting to select the CPU clock ratio. (Most CPU need not to select the CPU clock ratio because it is "LOCKED", please refer to Section 3.4 for the switch setting or section 4-11 for the BIOS setting.)

3.2 INSTALLING THE DRAM MODULES


This mainboard has two DIMM sockets designed on the mainboard as shown in the following diagram:



Outlook of DIMM modules:



(Single-Side DIMM Module)



(Double-Side DIMM Module)

Installation of DIMM modules:

1. Minimum one DIMM module must be installed on the mainboard.
2. Please use 3.3V PC-100 or PC-133 un-buffered DIMM module.
3. You can use single side or double side DIMM module on this mainboard.
4. You may install single bank or double bank DIMM module on the board. (please refer to the following to configure the memory sub-system.)
5. You may choose to install DIMM module starting from DIMM1 or DIMM2.
6. Maximum memory size: 1024MB

Configuration of memory sub-system:

Intel i815 chipset supports PC-100 and PC-133 DIMM modules. Basically, different setting in the CMOS setup program will decide the memory speed. (refer to CMOS setup “system memory frequency” in section 4-6). There are three different choices in the CMOS setup program, please refer to the following for the details:

AUTO: The system BIOS will read the memory chip information stored in the SPD chip on the DIMM module and then decide the speed of memory frequency automatically.

100MHz: No matter what kind of DIMM module is installed on the mainboard, the system BIOS will force the PC system running at 100 MHz.

133MHz: When 133MHz CPU is installed on the mainboard, no matter what kind of DIMM module is installed on the mainboard, the system BIOS will force the PC system running at 133 MHz. However, when 100MHz or 66MHz CPU is installed on the mainboard, the memory frequency will be fixed at 100MHz no matter what kind of DIMM module is installed on the mainboard.

According to the feature of Intel i815 chipset, there is some limitation when installing DIMM modules on the mainboard, Different setup of “System Memory Frequency” setting in the CMOS setup may have different requirement (refer to section 4-6

for details), *please refer to the table in the next page for details:*

Note: When the CPU installed on the mainboard is 66MHz or 100MHz CPU, the memory frequency will be 100 MHz all the time despite the setting in the CMOS setup program..

When the CPU installed on the mainboard is 133MHz, you need to pay more attention when configuring the memory sub-system. please refer to the following table for the memory configuration.

Following is some additional information for memory installation for your reference:


1. When the setting of "System Memory Frequency" is 100MHz, no matter what kind of DIMM module is installed on the board, it will force the system memory running at 100MHz.
2. When the setting of "System Memory Frequency" is 133MHz and the CPU is also 133MHz, then the memory speed will b133MHz be all the time.
3. When the setting of "System Memory Frequency" is 133MHz but the CPU FSB is 100MHz, then the memory speed will be reduced to100MHz despite the type of the onboard DIMM module.

3.3 CONNECTORS

The connectors on the mainboard are either the pin header type or D-type connectors, they are used to connect the accessories or peripheral devices (such as power, mouse, printer,...etc.). 3.4 JUMPER SETTINGS

This section will discuss the jumper setting on the mainboard. In order to let you have better idea of the jumper setting, please see below for the explanation of jumper settings before you start this section.




A jumper is a set of two, three or more jumper pins which allows users to make different system configuration by putting the plastic connector plug (mini-jumper) on it. The jumper setting is necessary when installing different components onto the mainboard.

The following jumpers which labeled with “optional” means they are the optional choice for customers and the related components are normally not populated on the mainboard.

(A) JP1: Keyboard and PS/2 Mouse OnNow function selection

The Keyboard and PS/2 Mouse OnNow function is designed on the mainboard and you can use keyboard and mouse key clicks to power on the PC system. However, there may have some keyboard and mouse are not compatible with the OnNow function and that will cause the PC system fail to boot. Since we can not control what keyboard and mouse will be connected to the PC system, so there is the JP1 designed on the mainboard to control the OnNow function. Please refer to the following picture and select the proper setting on JP1:




Note: The default setting of JP1 is “OnNow Disabled”. If you want to use the Keyboard / mouse key click to power on the PC system, you have to change the JP1 setting so that the “OnNow” function will be enabled.

(B) JP2: CPU Voltage (Vcore) Range Selection (optional)

The voltage regulator on the mainboard will generate 1.3V ~ 3.5V DC to support different processors. Basically, most mainboards will use the CPU VID signal (VID0~VID4) from the CPU to decide the proper CPU core voltage (Vcore). In case that there is the poor connection between CPU and its socket, or uninstall the CPU from the mainboard while the system power is "ON". Under such circumstance, mainboard may receive wrong VID signal and send wrong Vcore to the CPU. Unfortunately, wrong Vcore may destroy the CPU and the mainboard.

In order to protect the mainboard and the CPU from the unexpected damage, JP2 is introduced on the mainboard to control the Vcore within the safe range so that it won't make any damage to the CPU or mainboard because of wrong VID signal.

Since most Pentium II/!!! processors require the Vcore below 2.05V except few Pentium II processors. So the default setting of JP2 will control the Vcore between 1.3V and 2.05V so that the CPU and mainboard will have a good protection. Please do not change the setting on JP2 unless your CPU needs the voltage higher than 2.05V.




Note: When JP2 is not installed on the mainboard, then the Vcore range will be 1.3V ~ 2.05V.

(C) JP3: CPU Voltage Adjustment (optional)

Sometimes you may feel that the CPU voltage detected by the mainboard can not meet your requirement. You want to make the CPU voltage a little bit higher than what is detected by the mainboard. In this case, you may use the JP3 setting to adjust the CPU voltage.


When "SHORT" is selected, the CPU voltage will be 0.05V higher than normal setting. .



Note: Use JP3 to change the CPU core voltage does not mean that over clocking is allowed. Basically, there are many issues which will decide whether over clock will be successful or not. For example, the VGA card, HDD, DRAM and CPU etc. If any of the device can not meet the over clock requirement, you will be failed when over clocking.

(D) JP9: Clear Power On Password

In case that you forget the Power On password which you had selected in the BIOS setup program and you can not start your PC system, you can always use JP9 to clear the Power On Password..

**How to use JP9 to clear the Power On Password:**


- 1. Unplug the AC power cable from the PC system.*
- 2. Open the cabinet of the PC system.*
- 3. Make the short connection on JP9 by using a mini jumper.*
- 4. After 3 ~ 5 seconds, remove the mini jumper from JP9.*
- 5. Close the cabinet and Re-connect the AC power cable.*
- 6. Power on the PC system and then run BIOS setup program to reconfigure the PC system.*

IMPORTANT:

When you have used JP9 to clear the Power On password, the BIOS setting which is saved in the CMOS memory will be cleared as well. So please run the BIOS setup program to configure the parameters of the PC system, or use “Load Optimized Defaults” and have the optimized parameters loaded into the BIOS setup program.

(E) JP11: Clear CMOS Data Button

In case that you made improper setting in the BIOS setup program and cause the PC system not working, you may use JP9 to clear all the setting which is recorded in the CMOS memory.



Note: Improper BIOS setting may cause hang-up to the PC system, Should it be happened, you may use JP9 to clear the information which is stored in the CMOS memory and get the PC system back to normal. Improper connection may cause permanent damage to the mainboard. Please refer to the following steps to clear the CMOS


1. Unplug the AC power cable from the PC system.
2. Open the cabinet of the PC system.
3. Put the mini jumper on pin 2-3 of JP11 around 3 to 5 seconds and then return it to the original position (pin 1-2).
4. Close the cabinet and Re-connect the AC power cable.
5. Power on the PC system and then run BIOS setup program to reconfigure the PC system.

IMPORTANT:

After you have used JP11 and clear the setting which is saved in the CMOS memory, we suggest that you use “Load Optimized Defaults” and have the optimized parameters loaded into the BIOS setup program. Such parameters were fine tuned and they will let you have the optimized performance and stability.

(F) SW1: FSB Clock Selection

SW1 is designed on the board to choose the CPU FSB clock (Front Side Bus Clock). Basically, you don't have to worry about the FSB clock setting most of the time, because it will be detected by the mainboard BIOS automatically. However, sometimes you may feel like to select different FSB clock for some special purpose. In this case, you may use the BIOS setting to select different FSB clock or use the switch setting on SW1 to force your CPU to use the selected FSB clock. *(Please do not attempt to change this setting unless you are the technician)..*

**Note:**


- 1. SW1 will have no function unless "Default" is selected in the "CPU Host/PCI Clock / PC133" selection field in the BIOS setup program (refer to Section. 4-11). Please do not to make jumper setting on SW1 unless you are the professional technician.**
- 2. When "Default" is selected, you may use SW1 to select different speed of CPU clock and force your CPU to use that clock speed instead of letting the system BIOS to select the CPU clock automatically.**

**IMPORTANT NOTICE:**

When you are changing the setting on SW1, please make sure to remove the power core from the PC system. According to the i815 chipset feature, the PC system will hang up if you change the setting without removing the power core.






3.5 INSTALLATION OF DEVICE DRIVERS

There is a CD which comes with the mainboard. The CD contains the device drivers which is necessary when installing the mainboard. Please refer to the following procedures to install the device drivers.

1. When you have installed the operation system, you will have to install some device driver of the mainboard so that it will work normally.
2. Insert the CD diskette into the CD ROM Drive (suppose it is "D:") which comes with the mainboard
3. Change the directory to D:\Driver\mainboard\Intel\815\inf"
4. Double click on the program –“InfInst-autol.exe” and the program will install the related device drivers for the mainboard automatically.




Note:

The sequence of the device driver is very important, please follow the procedures above to install the related device driver.

Note: You have to run “InfInst-autol.exe” to install the related device driver when you are using the Windows 95/98 operation system. If you are using the operation system like Windows NT and Windows 2000, you need not to install the device driver because it is supported by these operation systems already.

5. Change the directory to "\Driver\mainboard\Intel\815\VGA" and then choose the operation system to install the device driver of the onboard VGA interface.
6. Install the device driver for the on board audio interface.
The codec (see the following picture) installed on the board can be different and they will need the different device driver. Please refer to the following to install the correct device driver:



Onboard Codec on U12 is "ad1881A":

Change the directory to "\Driver\mainboard\Intel\815\ad1881A" and then choose the operation system to install the onboard audio device driver.

Change the directory to "\Driver\mainboard\Intel\815\4299" and then choose the operation system to install the onboard audio device driver.

4. AWARD BIOS SETUP

4.1 GETTING STARTED

When you turn the system powered on or reset the PC system, the system BIOS will enter the POST routines (Power On Self Test routines). POST will execute a series of diagnostics and system initialization, and you will see the copyright message displayed on the screen.) In case that there is any error or malfunction detected, the BIOS will give a series of beeping sound or display the error message on screen.

During the power on self test (POST), the following message appears at the lower left corner of the screen:

" Press **DEL** to enter SETUP "

To execute the Award® BIOS CMOS Setup program, please press the **DEL** key when you see the above message displayed on the screen, and it will trigger the BIOS setup utility. When you start the BIOS setup program, you will see the "STANDARD CMOS SETUP" displayed on the screen as shown in the next page:

When you have started the BIOS setup program, you will see a list of control key show at the bottom of the screen. You can use the keyboard to move the selection bar and choose the proper setting in each selection field. Please refer to the following for the definition of the control keys:

Arrow Keys : Use the arrow keys to move the cursor to the desired item.

Enter : Select the desired item.

F1 : Display the help screen for the selected feature.

ESC : Exit to the previous screen.

PgUp(-)/PgDn(+): Modify or change the content of the highlighted item.

F5 : Retrieves the previous value from CMOS data,
(only the current page setup will be retrieved).

F7 : Loads the SETUP default values from BIOS default table,
(only the current page setup will be loaded).

F10 : Save all changes to CMOS RAM from the MAIN MENU

IDE Primary / Secondary Master / Slave:

These two selection fields allow you to select the HDD type which is installed on the primary/secondary IDE port. Move the selection bar to the appropriate field and then click on the "ENTER" key and the system BIOS will detect the HDD type automatically.

Drive A/B:

These two selection fields allow you to select the type of the floppy drive. Check the floppy drive installed in the system and then use this field to select the correct type.

Floppy 3 Mode Support: (Default setting: disabled)

This mode is for the Japanese 3.5 inch high capacity floppy disk drive. If you have such drive installed in your PC system, please select enable, otherwise, use the default setting.

Video:

This selection field allows you to select the display mode. Check the video display card installed in the PC system and then use this selection field to choose the proper display mode.

Virus Warning :

In order to avoid virus infection happens on your PC system, This mainboard provides the virus warning features in the BIOS. When you find any warning message displayed your screen, please run the anti-virus program to see whether your system is infected by a virus or not.

Enabled : A warning message will be displayed on the screen when something attempts to access the boot sector or hard disk partition table.

Disabled : No warning message will appear on the screen when anything attempts to access the boot sector or hard disk partition table.

CPU Internal Cache / External Cache : (default setting: Enabled)

These fields allow you to turn on or turn off the Level 1 and Level 2 cache that built-in Pentium™ !!! processors.

CPU L2 Cache ECC Checking: (default setting: Enabled)

This option will enable or disable the ECC checking on the CPU L2 cache. The ECC checking will ensure the accuracy of the data stored on the L2 cache.

Processor Number Feature: (default setting: Disabled)

You can not see this selection field unless you have the Pentium !!! processor installed on the mainboard. There is the serial code inside every Pentium !!! processor and it will be accessed by application to show your personal ID. If you don't feel like to give your serial code to other people, select the "Disabled" setting.

Quick Power on Self Test: (default setting: Enabled)

The Quick Power On Self Test will skip some test and speed up the boot process. If you find the system is working normally, you can always enable this feature so that you don't have to wait too long on the POST.

First / Second / Third / Fourth Boot Device :

These fields allow you to decide the sequence of the boot devices. When you start up the PC system, The system BIOS will try to load the operation system from the device which is selected in the "First Boot Device" field. If the system BIOS can not find the operation system, then it will try to find the operation system indicated in the "Second Boot Device" ...etc.

Swap Floppy Drive : (default setting: Disabled)

ACPI function : (Default setting: “Enabled”)

When Enabled, the PC system will have the ACPI function. However, if you want to use the ACPI function, you have to use the most updated operation system like Windows 98 at the same time. When installing Windows 98, you will have to give some specific parameter so that the ACPI function will be installed into your PC system.. (please refer to the manual of Windows 98 for the parameters)

When the ACPI function is installed in your PC system successfully, you will find the ACPI function in the power management icon. The PW switch (mentioned in Section 3) defined by the ACPI is different to the BIOS setup and it always has the higher priority than what was defined in the system BIOS.

According to what was defined by the ACPI in Windows 98, the PW switch can be either the "Standby switch" or "shutdown switch". When "Standby switch" is selected, the first click on the PW switch will have the PC system turn into standby mode. If you want to "wake up" the PC system, you will have to use the devices (such as keyboard, mouse .. etc) which is specified in the Windows 98 ACPI function to trigger the PC system so that it will be back to full-on mode. When you use the "User Password" to log into the BIOS setup program, you can only select "User Password", "SAVE & EXIT SETUP" and "EXIT WITHOUT SAVING" from the main menu. (Use Supervisor Password to log into the PC system, you will have the complete right to on all BIOS settings.)

2. When "System" is selected in Security Option:

When turn on the PC system, it will request you to enter the Password. Without correct password, PC system will stop and the operation system won't be loaded.

B. When there is no password stored in the "SUPERVISOR PASSWORD"

1. When "Setup" is selected in Security Option:

Users can use the "User Password" to log into the BIOS setup program, and they can make all the change in the BIOS setup program.

2. When "System" is selected in Security Option:

When turn on the PC system, it will request you to enter the Password. Without the correct password, the PC system will stop and the operation system will not be loaded.

This option will save all setup values to CMOS RAM & EXIT SETUP routine. Move the selection bar to “SAVE & EXIT SETUP” and pressing “Enter” key, then types “Y” and “Enter” key, the values will be saved and all the information will be stored in the CMOS memory, and then the setup program will be terminated and the system will start to reboot.

Move the selection bar to “Save & Exit Setup” and click on the “Enter” key, then you will be asked to confirm the action to save, press the “Y” and “Enter” key, the setup information will be saved into the CMOS memory and the system will start to reboot.

Select this field will exit the setup routine without saving any changed values to CMOS RAM, When you do not want to save your change to the CMOS memory, you may choose to run this option and the setting what you made in the BIOS setup routine will be given away.

Move the selection bar to “EXIT WITHOUT SAVING” and click on the “Enter” key, then you will be asked to confirm the action to exit, press the “Y” and “Enter” key, the setup program will be terminated and the system will start to reboot.

5. How to Update the System BIOS

Before we start to discuss system BIOS update, there are some important issues which you need to pay attention on it:

1. You can not exchange the system BIOS with another mainboard:

The system BIOS on different mainboard are different. If you take the system BIOS from another mainboard and have it installed on this mainboard, you may find that the mainboard fail to boot. Even the mainboard from the same manufacturer, the content of the system BIOS can be different. So please do not exchange the system BIOS.

2. Where to get the updated BIOS?

You can visit the web page of the supplier and down load the updated system BIOS. Please note that you will “kill” the PC system if you have the wrong BIOS written into the PC system. So please be sure to double check the system BIOS before you can use it to update the system BIOS.

3. No interruption is allowed during the BIOS updating:

When the BIOS updating, please do not restart the PC system or turn the power off. Otherwise, you will have a fragmentary system BIOS in your PC system and it will make you unable to start the PC system. If you reset or power off the PC system while the system BIOS is updating, you may have to send the PC system to the supplier for troubleshooting because you do not have the system BIOS in the PC system.

4. Do not change the onboard flash ROM:

The flash ROM is the storage device which is designed on the mainboard to store the system BIOS. There are different kinds of the flash ROM selling in the market. They have different capacity and different architecture. If you install improper flash ROM onto the mainboard, it may cause unexpected damage to the mainboard. So please never change the flash ROM on the mainboard, otherwise, the warranty will be void.

SYSTEM BIOS UPDATE PROCEDURE**Step 1. Download the system BIOS from the web page:**

1. Visit the following web page:
<http://www.azza.com.tw>
2. Select "TECH SUPPORT"
3. Down load "AWDFLASH.EXE" program.
4. Scroll the screen downward and find the 815TM mainboard..
5. Select the BIOS and start to down load. (Suppose the file name is 815TM.BIN)

Step 2. Prepare for the BIOS updating:

1. Windows is the multi task environment and some unexpected interruption can be occurred and stop the BIOS updating. Since no interruption is allowed during the BIOS updating. so the BIOS updating can not be made under the Windows environment.
2. Get a floppy diskette and put it into the floppy disk drive.
3. Key-in the following command under the DOS prompt:

C:> FORMAT A:/S

4. When the diskette formatting is completed, have the files which you down loaded from the web page copied into the floppy diskette. (815TM.BIN and AWDFLASH.EXE).

Step 3. Start to update the system BIOS:

1. Have the diskette which we made in Step 2 inserted in the floppy disk drive..
2. Start the PC system and click on the “del” key to start the BIOS setup program. Select the “Advanced BIOS features” and then make sure to select the floppy disk drive is the first boot device.
3. Having made the boot sequence selection, save the setup and restart the PC system.
4. When the DOS prompt “A:>” appears, run the AWDFLASH.EXE program. (You can use “AWDFLASH /?” to more detail of the program.)
5. When you have started the “AWDFLASH.EXE”, it will ask you to input the file name of the new BIOS. Key-in “815TM.BIN” and then click the “ENTER” key.
6. When you see the message - Do you want to save BIOS (Y/N)?. you may choose “Y” to have the onboard BIOS copied in to the floppy diskette. If you do not want to make the backup copy of the onboard BIOS, simply chose “N” and start to update the system BIO. (if you want to make a backup copy of the onboard system BIOS, then select “Y” and then give a file name to the backup copy.)
7. You will see from the screen whether you are going to start the BIOS update. If you are sure that the new BIOS is correct and nothing is wrong, chose “Y” to start the BIOS update. (you can chose “N” and terminate the BIOS update program.)
8. During the BIOS updating, you will see the “Programming Flash Memory” message display on the screen. (***IMPORTANT: you can not stop or reset the PC system when the BIOS is updating.***)
9. When the BIOS update is completed, remove the floppy diskette from the floppy disk drive and restart the PC system..
10. When you see the PC system start to boot, it indicate that the BIOS update is successful.
11. Click the “del” key during the Power On Self Test to trigger the BIOS setup program..
12. Chose "Load Optimized Default" and have the default setting written into the CMOS memory.
13. Chose "Save and Exit" and then restart the PC system.
14. Having finished the procedures above, the BIOS update is completed.

Note: In case something happened that made you unable to complete the BIOS update. You can always use the Portable BIOSTM to recover the system BIOS. (refer to section 1-2)
