Installation Instructions for Linux Customer Diagnostics 1.6 Release

The Linux Customer Diagnostics 1.6 release, in support of SGI ProPackTM 3 Service Pack 5 and above, contains the online diagnostics that you can use to test your deskside system. This document discusses these diagnostics and explains how to install them.

Online Diagnostics

The online diagnostics test system hardware while Linux is running. The online diagnostics test the CPU, cache, memory, graphics card, disk drive, and the ethernet ports.

The online diagnostics are installed in the /usr/diags/bin directory on your deskside system. You do not need to install them from the Linux Customer Diagnostics 1.6 release. If the online diagnostic files on your system are corrupted or missing, you can reinstall them by downloading the Linux Customer Diagnostics 1.6 release from SupportfolioTM (http://support.sgi.com/).

Installation Procedure

To install the online diagnostics from the Linux Customer Diagnostics 1.6 release, follow these steps:

- 1. Log on to the deskside as root.
- 2. Enter the following command:
 - # cd /dir

where dir is the directory in which you downloaded the software

3. Enter the following command:

```
# rpm -i ws_field_diags_sgilinux-1.6-x.ia64.rpm
```
