This product adds to or enhances features in the base SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 (SLES10) Service Pack 2 (SP2) Linux distribution or Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5.2 (RHEL 5.2) distribution. SGI ProPack 6 designed to run on any SGI Altix, SGI Altix XE, or SGI Altix ICE 8200 system.

Software updates for SLES10 SP2 are provided by Novell. In order to configure your system to enable online updates, you must register with Novell. For more help with this, you can use the **Novell Customer Center Configuration** tool available in the Software section of the YaST Control Center.

Customers that received SGI ProPack 6 pre-installed on their new SGI Altix system may run the following command to add the proper update source for SGI ProPack 6:

\$ /usr/sbin/sgi-propack-update-source

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This script will prompt you for your Supportfolio login and then add the proper SGI update source for the given architecture.

You can also use the yum software package manager to get updates, as follows:

% yum update

The yum software package manager checks for updates and then updates your system appropriately. You must be registered with RHN, for yum to get RHN RHEL 5.2 updates.

You can also use the Package Update (pup), which is a graphical tool for locating and installing updates, as follows:

% pup

You can configure the updatesd(8) notifier daemon to notify you of updates and potentially install the updates for you. Configuration is done via the yum-updatesd.conf(5) file.

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\$ /usr/sbin/sgi-foundation-update-source

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Software Planning and Installation

Note: SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 (SP2) **requires** the SGI Foundation 1 Service Pack 2 (SP2) software release. For more information, see the *SGI Foundation Software Start Here* available at http://docs.sgi.com.

This chapter describes the planning that you need to do to get started and provides instructions for installing SGI ProPack 6 for Linux SP2.

Your SGI Altix system comes with a base Linux distribution of SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 (SLES10) SP2 or Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5.2 (RHEL 5.2) and the SGI ProPack 6 SP2 for Linux software preinstalled. This chapter describes how to install the software from the CD if it should ever become necessary to reinstall it.

Note: For information on how to install, configure, and operate or update software on an SGI Altix ICE 8200 system, see the *SGI Tempo System Administrator's Guide* available at http://docs.sgi.com.

For security reasons, Linux requires a root password for login. The default password for your preinstalled software is sgisgi. After you have logged in, change this root password to a string of your own choice.

The SGI ProPack 6 SP2 for Linux software works only with the SLES10 SP2 environment or RHEL 5.2 environment. Earlier versions of these distributions, or any other distributions, are not compatible with SGI ProPack 6 for Linux SP2 software. Note that if you are currently running SGI ProPack 4 for Linux with SLES9 SP2 (or later), you cannot update only the SLES9 base operating system to SLES10 SP2. You must also update the SGI ProPack 4 software with SGI ProPack 6 in order to continue using the SGI ProPack features.

Before you install or configure your system, please read Chapter 1, "Release Features" so that you understand the features of SGI ProPack 6 SP2 software. You might also want to

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familiarize yourself with some or all of the documentation listed in "Related Publications" on page xviii.

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Systems with Multiple Ethernet Configurations

When doing a network installation on a system with multiple Ethernet interfaces, there is no guarantee about initial interface names. The first interface discovered will be named "eth0", and so on. This can make network installations confusing. If this is a problem, a workaround is to remove the Ethernet cards that are **not** being used to install software over the network. Once the installation is complete, the Ethernet cards can be reinstalled. A persistent naming mechanism ensures that an interface, once named, retains its name across system reboots.

Note: This section does not apply to SGI Altix XE systems.

XVM Volumes Access in Rescue Mode

You cannot access XVM Volumes in Rescue Mode on SGI ProPack 6 SP2 systems. It is possible to boot into rescue mode from the SLES10 SP2 DVD, but that DVD does not contain the xvm kernel module. This makes it is impossible to perform maintenance on XVM volumes from rescue mode at this time. SGI recommends that you do not migrate any system directories to XVM since there is no way to access them from rescue mode.

Note: This section does not apply to systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with RHEL 5.2. For this release, RHEL 5.2 does not support XFS or XVM.

Adding the xfs_quota Variable to the initrd Boot Image

You need to add xfs_quota to the INITRD_MODULES variable in the /etc/sysconfig/kernel file when rootflags=quota is set or the initrd boot loader will panic your system at boot time.

Note: This section does not apply to systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with RHEL 5.2. For this release, RHEL 5.2 does not support XFS.

irqbalance Utility on SGI ProPack 6 SP2 Systems Running RHEL 5.2

On SGI ProPack 6 SP2 systems running RHEL 5.2, the irqbalance utility is configured off. This utility distributes device interrupts across all the CPUs on a multiprocessor system with the purpose of spreading the load. On a distributed shared memory (DSM) multiprocessor computer system, such as an SGI Altix system, the distance (that is, the latency) to a given CPU from a given device, varies quite substantially as you add router hops. Because of this, the PROM on an SGI Altix system, does not pick a random CPU to process the interrupts of a device; it picks the optimum CPU to handle the interrupts. This irqbalance utility breaks this optimum CPU assignment. Therefore, it is configured off.

SLES10 SP2 or RHEL 5.2 Kernels

For ia64 systems, SLES10 SP2 contains two kernel variants, kernel-default and kernel-debug. During installation, if you do not explicitly select to install kernel-debug, your SGI Altix system will boot with the kernel-default variant after installation. For x86_64 systems, SLES10 SP2 contains kernel-default (1CPU), kernel-debug, kernel-smp (multi-CPU) and kernel-xen. SGI recommends and pre-installs kernel-smp for x86_64 systems.

RHEL 5.2 has two kernel images, kernel and kernel-xen for ia64 and x86_64 systems. The kernel-xen variant is only provided as a technology preview for ia64 systems, but is a fully supported kernel for x86_64 systems.

Linux Kernel Crash Dump

The two methods for getting crash dumps are, as follows:

- kdb/lkcd for SLES10 on Altix 4000 series systems
- kexec/kdump for RHEL 5 and SLES10 on Altix XE and Altix ICE systems

This section describes these two methods.

LKCD Crash Dump Facility

In the event of a system crash on SGI Altix 3000 and 4000 series systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP2 running SLES10 SP2, the Linux Kernel Crash Dump (LKCD) facility will

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save a crash dump that will appear in the <code>/var/log/dump</code> directory after your system reboots. SGI support personnel can analyze this file to determine the cause of the system crash.

If you wish to save crash dumps to a different location, edit the DUMPDIR variable in /etc/sysconfig/dump and then run the following command: lkcd config.

Note: Depending on which kernel you have installed, the system may enter the KDB kernel debugger after a crash. If a **kdb**> prompt appears on the console, type **sr d** to initiate a crash dump.

kexec/kdump Crash Dump Utility

In the event of a system crash onAltix XE and Altix ICE systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP2 running RHEL 5.2, the system uses the kexec/kdump crash dump utility. The kexec/kdump utility creates a Linux kernel crash dump at /var/crash/timestamp/vmcore if kexec/kdump is installed, enabled, and configured. After SGI ProPack 6 SP2 is installed, your system is set up to take dumps when needed. In order to analyze a crash dump, you need the debuginfo packages installed. For more information, see the SGI ProPack 6 SP2 release notes.

Latest PROM Firmware

Note: This section only applies to ia64 systems. For x86_64 systems, see "Getting the Latest Firmware/Software for Your SGI Altix XE System" on page 15.

Unless you have the most current PROM, the kernel may fail to boot during the installation procedure. The PROM version is printed when the system resets in the PROM banner.

The PROM RPM is now part of the SGI Foundation Software release. For more information, see the SGI Foundation 1 Service Pack 2 Software Start Here.

Note: SGI Altix 450 or SGI Altix 4700 systems running SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 should use the PROM located in shub2snprom.bin. The System Controller 1.22 release provides a sys_ctrl-ProPackICE_1.22.tar file that installs onto an SGI Altix ICE 8200 system to service an Altix 450 that provides NAS support. All other SGI systems should use the PROM located in shub1snprom.bin. This note does not apply to SGI Altix XE systems (instead see "Getting the Latest Firmware/Software for Your SGI Altix XE System" on page 15). Software support contract customers can download the most recent PROM versions from SGI Supportfolio: https://support.sgi.com/

You can determine the PROM level installed on your machine, as follows:

```
% cat /proc/sgi_prominfo/node*/version
4.74
SGI SAL Version 4.74 rel070313 IP41 built 10:14:15 AM Mar 13, 2007
```

On an SGI Altix 4700 system, the output from the version file looks similar to the following:

```
% cat /proc/sgi_prominfo/node*/version
SGI SAL Version 1.21 rel070201 IP65 built 08:38:57 AM Feb 1, 2007
```

The PROM RPM on the SGI Foundation Software CD contains all of the appropriate flash images for SGI systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP2. The flash utility chooses the appropriate image for your machine from this RPM.

Getting the Latest Firmware/Software for Your SGI Altix XE System

For information on the latest firmware for you Altix XE system, see the *SGI Foundation Software Start Here* available at http://docs.sgi.com.

License Manager Updates

Please backup your license key files prior to installing SLES10 SP2 and/or SGI ProPack 6 SP2. A license key file is **not** included in these RPMs. Your original license key files will need to be restored after you complete your installation.

In terms of software licensing support, the Red Hat and SUSE distributors do not ship any code. ISVs are responsible for obtaining and including software licensing components into their products.

For information on the SGI software licensing mechanism called LK, see the SGI Foundation Software Start Here available at http://docs.sgi.com.

Read Me First - Installing SLES10 SP2 or RHEL 5.2 on Your SGI System

Note: For information on how to install, configure, and operate software on an SGI Altix ICE 8200 system, see the *SGI Tempo System Administrator's Guide* available at http://docs.sgi.com.

This section provides some information about installing SLES10 SP2 on SGI Altix systems. You need to have SLES10 SP2 or RHEL 5.2 installed before you can install SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2.

Note: If you are installing Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5.2 (RHEL 5.2), you can proceed to "Installing RHEL 5.2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2" on page 45.

For installation instructions, see "Installing SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2" on page 19.

Note: If you are currently running SLES10 GA (SLES10 with no service pack), SGI recommends that you to do an online update of SLES10 to get it to the latest level and then install SGI ProPack 6 SP2. For installation instructions, see "Installing SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2" on page 19

In general, the documentation that comes with SUSE applies to installing software on an SGI Altix system. This section provides some notes to get you started, as follows:

Note: Please read all the notes below before attempting installation.

• Find installation documentation.

You can find installation documentation on the SLES10 SP2 DVD in the docu/en directory. It contains these .pdf documentation files:

```
apparmor-admin.pdf preparation.pdf sles-admin.pdf startup.pdf
```

Find and read the SLES10 SP2 release notes.

It is important to read the SLES10 SP2 release notes as well. You will find them in a text file named <code>RELEASE-NOTES</code>. en.txt in the root directory of the SLES10 SP2 DVD. The YaST installation tool can also get the latest version of the release notes directly from Novell. On the installed system, the latest version of the release notes are at the following location:

/usr/share/doc/release-notes/SUSE_Linux_Enterprise_Server_10/RELEASE-NOTES.en.html

How to erase everything and start with a clean root drive.

The YaST installer does not allow you to remove older partitions and create a clean root by default. To do so, you must run the YaST Partitioner in "Expert Mode" (see the *SLES10 Installation and Administration* manual). The default filesystem type for partitions is reiserfs. To create partitions with the XFS filesystem type, manually "Edit" the partition and then select XFS. Boot partitions on SGI Altix systems should always use the FAT filesystem.

Find the best installation method for SLES10 SP2 for your site.

There are several different methods to install SLES10 SP2. To use the graphical YaST installation, SGI recommends using the vnc or ssh methods, assuming the SGI system is connected to a network.

Insert the media in the DVD drive and reset the machine. The BIOS on x86_64 systems should already be configured to attempt booting from CD first. The SLES10 SP2 media should boot when the system comes back up.

To use this mode on ia64 systems, SGI suggests the **EFI Shell [Built-in]** from the **Boot Maintenance** menu. A list of fs# devices will be presented before you get to the Shell> prompt. One from the list, will have the word CDROM in the display. If the fs# associated with the CDROM is 1, enter the following commands:

```
Shell> fs1:
fs1:\> cd efi\boot
```

You are now ready to launch the installer. Issue the following command:

```
fs1:\efi\boot> bootia64
```

You now will see a list of choices including Installation, Installation - Safe Settings, and so on. Keep the default Installation choice highlighted. In the boot: prompt, your selection depends on the type of system you are booting.

If you prefer to install using vnc or ssh, enter vnc=1 or usessh=1 in the Boot: line.

If you are installing software on an Altix system you need to specify information about the serial console on the boot line. If you wish to use vnc or ssh, you can supply those options as well. An example boot line specifying the serial console for installation and the use of vnc is similar to the following:

For ia64:

boot: console=ttySG0,38400n8 vnc=1

For x86_64:

If you are using a VGA monitor/keyboard to install, you do not need to supply any options.

If you are using a serial console, the setting depends on how the system is configured. An example is, as follows:

```
boot: console=ttyS1,38400n8 vnc=1
```

Note: If ttyS1 does not work, try ttyS0. The serial cable might be attached to the other serial port

For ia64 systems, if you choose to install over the serial console or an L2 controller with xterm, note that the serial console may not be 100% clean and that you may run into "screen corruption". Often this can be cleared up by entering Ctrl-L from the command line, which re-draws the screen. When using xterm, remember to set the encoding to UTF-8. The following command line options have yielded fairly good results:

```
xterm -sb -en UTF-8 -geometry 130x40 -e "cu -s 38400 -l /dev/ttySG0"
```

Find out how to perform a network installation.

If you plan to set up a system to do network installations, you may find the "Network Install Server Setup" in this document helpful. This section describes how to integrate SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with SUSE operating system repositories.

Find information on AutoYaST.

For information on AutoYaST, see "Using AutoYaST" on page 38.

Installing SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2

Note: SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 **requires** the SGI Foundation Software 1 Service Pack 2 release. For more information, see the *SGI Foundation 1 Service Pack 2 Software Start Here* available at http://docs.sgi.com.

To install SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 Service Pack 2 (SLES10 SP2) from the DVD media, perform the procedures described in this section.

Note: Before starting a fresh install of SLES 10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2 over the existing operating system, it is a good idea to remove the production root drive from your system. Perform the fresh install over the operating system on your backup root drive. This provides a fall back route to your previous operating system, in case of application compatibility issues.

Installation Overview

A general overview of the procedure steps are, as follows:

- Power down your system and replace the production root drive with the backup drive if one is available. SGI recommends using a backup drive in case you run into problems.
- Insert the SLES 10 SP2 DVD in your DVD-ROM, and boot your system.
- Start the installation, using **vnc=1** option to start a VNC server and be sure to set the console= setting appropriately to use the serial console (see "Read Me First Installing SLES10 SP2 or RHEL 5.2 on Your SGI System" on page 16).
- On an SGI Altix XE system, make sure that BIOS is configured to boot from the DVD before the hard drive.
- Using a VNC client or compatible web browser that can run the VNC client java applet, connect to YaST remotely.
- Configure the partition layout of the drive, by changing the partition type of the root partition from Reiser to XFS.
- Modify the default software selections, by adding the Apache Server to the installation.

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Installation Procedure

Note: Read Part 1 "Deployment" in *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and* Administration manual that resides in sles-admin.pdf file in the docu directory of the SLES10 SP2 DVD before beginning this installation procedure.

To install SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 (SLES10) SP2 from the DVD media, perform the following steps:

Note: These steps correspond to Section 3.2.2 "Selecting the Source of the Installation Data" of *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual. In this example, the source of installation will be "**Installing from SUSE Linux Enterprise Media**". (DVD)

1. Insert the SLES 10 SP2 Installation DVD in the DVD drive and reboot your system.

EFI Boot Manager




Figure 2-1 EFI Boot Manager Menu

2. When the system returns to the **EFI Boot Manager Menu**, boot the system on the SLES10 SP2 Install DVD via the Boot CDROM/DVD boot option as shown in Figure 2-1.

- 3. If there is not a **Boot CDROM/DVD** option, it can be added to the boot menu as follows:
 - a. Select **Boot option maintenance menu**
 - b. Select **Add a boot option**
 - c. Highlight the **Removable media boot** line
 - d. Enter Boot CDROM/DVD for the name
 - e. For **New Boot Option Data**, enter **n**
 - f. Save to nyram
 - g. Choose **Exit** on the next two screens to return to the main menu
 - h. Select your new **Boot CDROM/DVD** option to boot from the CD




Figure 2-2 Boot Screen

- 4. From the boot screen, select **Installation** and add the appropriate **Boot Options** to start the installation, as shown in Figure 2-2.

Note: This section corresponds to the Section 3.3, "The Boot Screen" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual.

- 5. These Boot Options will start the installation via the serial console and finish by using YaST on a remote system using VNC:
 - **console=ttySG0,38400** Select the serial console as the output source for ia64 systems. Sets the baud rate to 38400.
 - console=ttyS1,38400 Select the serial console as the output source for x86_64 systems. Sets the baud rate to 38400. Set ttyS1 or ttyS0 depending on the port to which the serial cable is connected.
 - **vnc=1 Start a VNC Server**, to allow using a web browser, or VNC client program.
 - **vncpassword=your_password** The password the VNC server will use to authenticate the user. Must be at least 6 characters.

There is no **console**= selection for VGA screen installs.

Note: For more examples of Boot Options, see Section 4.4.3, "Using Custom Boot Options" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.




Figure 2-3 Network Configuration Screen

Once the proper Boot Options are added, return starts the install program, and brings up the **Network Configuration Screen** as shown in Figure 2-3.

6. Choose DHCP by clicking on Yes or enter your information manually.

Note: If you manually enter the information, you will need system IP address, netmask, broadcast, and nameserver (if applicable).

There may be a delay here, while the system displays **Loading Data Into Ramdisk**.

The install program starts the VNC Server, once the network has been configured as shown in Figure 2-4.




Figure 2-5 VNC Server via a Web Browser

8. The **License Agreement** window appears. Click on the **Next** button to continue.

Installation




Figure 2-6 Installation Mode Window

9. From the **Installation Mode** window as shown in Figure 2-6, click on the New **Installation button** and the **Include Add-On Products from Separate Media** button, since you will also be adding SGI ProPack 6 SP2 software and then click on the **Next** button to continue.

Note: SGI ProPack 6 SP2 **requires** the SGI Foundation 1 SP2 software release be installed. For more information, see the *SGI Foundation 1 Service Pack 2 Software Start Here* available at http://docs.sgi.com. If SGI Foundation Software 1 SP2 release is not installed, a **Dependency Conflict** error message appears.

- 10. From the **Add-On Product Installation** window, click on the **Add** button and then click the **Next** button to continue.
- 11. From the **Add-On Product Media** window, click on the **CD** button and then the **Next** button to continue.

Installation of Add-on Products (especially SGI ProPack 6 SP2)

- 12. Remove and replace the SLES10 SP2 DVD with the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 CD when prompted and then from the **Insert the Add-on Product DVD** screen, click on the **Continue** button to continue.




Figure 2-7 Import Untrusted GnuPG Key Screen

- 13. From the **Import Untrusted GnuPG Key** screen as shown in Figure 2-7, click on the **Import** button to import the SGI Key into YaST.

16. From the Clock and Time Zone window, choose the appropriate Region and Time Zone and then click on the Next button to continue.

Partitioning Set Up

Note: See Section 3.9.1, "Partitioning" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

17. From the **Installation Settings** window, click on the **Change->Partitioning** pull down menu, to bring up the **Expert Partitioner Tool**.

Note: The first time, the tool asks how to initialize the configuration.

The following steps show partitioning on a very basic level. Read the partitioning section in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual. Additional information can be found in Section 7.5.8 "Partitioner". The YaST partitioning utility is very powerful and flexible, but must be used with care, by knowledgeable personnel. Select **Create Custom Partition Setup** if you need to tailor the size or number of partitions beyond what YaST has chosen or you wish to delete existing partitions and create new ones. Follow these guidelines in all cases:

- The EFI boot partition file system format type for ia64 systems should be FAT.
- If creating a new partition structure, always create the EFI boot partition for ia64 systems first or the system may not boot.
- Pay attention to whether or not you wish the partition to be formatted. The default is to format the partition.
- SGI suggests using XFS for all root filesystems.
- Always review the actions shown in the Installation Settings Window.

- 18. From the **Suggested Partitioning** window, click on the **Base Partition Setup on This Proposal** button to reuse the existing partitions. YaST defaults to the **Reiser**filesystem type, so you will need to change the root filesystem type to **XFS** and
 format both it and the boot partition before starting the install and then click on the **Next** button to continue.
- 19. From the **Expert Partitioner** window, select the root partition as shown and click on the **Edit** button and change the filesystem type to XFS.
- 20. From the **Edit Existing Partition** window, perform the following:
 - Verify that the Format button is selected.
 - Set the filesystem type to **XFS** using the pull-down menu
 - Verify the **Mount Point** is set to "/"

Note: Changes made at this point are not yet being written to the drive. No action will be taken until **Accept** is clicked in the **Installation Settings** Window to accept the final configuration.

Click the OK button which will close the **Edit** window and then go back to the **Expert Partitioner** window.

- 21. Click on the **Edit** button on the **Expert Partitioner** window.
- 22. For ia64 systems only, from the **Edit Existing Partition** window, perform the following:
 - Verify that the **Format** button is selected
 - Set the filesystem type to FAT using the drop-down menu
 - Verify the **Mount Point** is set to "/boot/efi"
 - Clicking the OK button, will close the Edit window, and go back to the Expert Partitioner
- 23. Verify the following settings in the **Expert Partitioner** window:
 - The boot and root partitions now have an F in the F column, indicating they will be formatted
 - The filesystem type for the root partition is now XFS.
 - Click on the **Finish** button to return to the **Installation Settings** screen.

24. Verify the partitioning information in the **Partitioning** section of the **Installation Settings** screen.

Caution: Pay special attention to the actions scheduled to be performed by the **Partitioning** section. There may be some default actions picked by the **Expert Partitioner** that you did not notice, if you have existing partitions that you want to keep. In the example above, the settings are as specified.

Software Selection and System Tasks

Note: See Section 3.9.2, "Software" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

- 25. Click the **Change->Software** menu to bring up the **Software Selection and System Tasks** screen.
- 26. The left panel of the **Software Selection and System Tasks** screen shows packages grouped by **Filter: Patterns.** Check marks show which packages are presently selected for installation. To install SGI ProPack 6 SP2 as an Add-On product, perform the following:
 - Choose **SGI ProPack** pattern to install SGI ProPack.
 - Optionally, choose SGI REACT if you are an SGI Real-Time customer.

Note: To install SGI ProPack 6 SP2 kernel modules for other kernel variants (for example, debug), click the **SGI ProPack Kernel Modules** pattern for that kernel variant.

27. YaST reports all the package changes which your selection has triggered. Click the **Continue** button to continue.

The **Installation Settings** screen now reflects the desired partitioning and formatting of the disk and the addition of **SGI ProPack**.

28. If the language needs to be changed, select **Language**. See Section 3.9.3, "Language" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

Setting Default Runlevel

Note: See Section 3.9.4, "Default Runlevel" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

- 29. Click on the **Expert** button on the **Installation Settings** screen.
- 30. Select **Change-->Default Runlevel** from the **Installation Settings** screen.
- 31. From the **Set Default Runlevel** Window, select **3: Full multiuser with network** and the click the **OK** button to continue.

The Installation Settings screen now shows Default Runlevel as 3: Full multiuser with network.

Performing the Installation

Note: See Section 3.9.9, "Performing the Installation" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise* Server Installation and Administration manual.

32. Examine all settings on the **Installation Settings** screen and click **Accept** if satisfied they are all correct.

Tip: The **Expert** tab has additional configuration options.

- 33. A **Confirm Installation** window appears. This is the last opportunity to make any configuration changes. Any disk formatting will happen now if the **Install** button is clicked. Use the **Back** button to double check if needed.
- 34. Replace the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 CD with the SLES10 SP2 and then click the **OK** button to continue.
 - The **Package Installation** window appears. After partitioning is done, the selected software packages are installed
- 35. When prompted for the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 CD, insert it in the drive and click the **OK** button.

Once the install of all packages is done, the system will finish the basic installation and prepare the system for initial boot. When the reboot dialog box appears, click the **OK** button and the system will reboot.

Once the system reboots, you should find a SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 SP2 boot option in your boot manager.

Without manual intervention, the system will boot automatically into SLES10 SP2. If you are using VNC, the VNC server will be restarted.

36. Reconnect to the VNC server using a VNC client or VNC capable web browser (see step 5).

Setting Up Your Hostname and Domain Name

Note: See Section 3.10.1, "Hostname" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

37. Enter your **Hostname** and **Domain Name** and then click the **Next** button to continue.

Setting Up Your root Password

Note: See Section 3.10.2, "root Password" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual.

38. Enter the password for the root account and then click the **Next** button to continue.

Network Configuration

Note: See Section 3.10.3, "Network Configuration" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise*Server Installation and Administration manual.

39. Review the information provided in the **Network Configuration** window. If everything is correct, click **Use Following Configuration** button and then click the **Next** button to continue. If the network information is not correct, click the **Change** button and use the options in the pull-down window to make any necessary changes for your specific network configuration.

Note: If your network requires a proxy, make sure it is set correctly before proceeding to the **Test Internet Connection** window.

40. From the **Test Internet Connection** window, verify that the device you will use to connect to the Internet is listed on the screen and click the **Next** button to continue. If the device is not correct, make any modifications that are necessary using the + button.

If the system is able to access the Internet, it will try to download the latest SLES10 SP2 release notes and any available product updates. If you are installing SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with SLES10 SP2, the error dialog shown in Figure 2-8 appears when the installer goes to check for SGI ProPack 6 SP2 updates.



Figure 2-8 Server Connect Error Message




Figure 2-9 Server and Directory Window

- 41. Existing SGI customers with Supportfolio accounts should click on the **Yes** button to display the window shown in Figure 2-9.
- 42. Uncheck the **Anonymous** box and enter your Supportfolio user name and password and then click the **OK** button. This step lets your system know where the SGI ProPack online update source is located. If you are unable to configure the online update sources, you can configure it at a later time via the Software section in the YaST Control Center.

43. If your Internet connection is successful, the **Novell Customer Center Configuration** window appears. SGI recommends that you check the **Config Now**button and register your system with Novell. If you have your registration number that came with your SLES10 SP2 purchase, you may provide that information when prompted to register your subscription with Novell. If you do not have your registration number at this time, the installer will use a temporary registration code so that you can complete this step. You can re-register using your official registration code at a later time.

Online Updates for SLES and SGI ProPack 6 SP2

Note: Note: See Section 3.10.5, "Online Update" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual. This section describes how to download/install any available updates for the products you are installing. For general information about getting updates for your system, see "Getting Updates" on page 4.

44. If you were able to complete the previous step and register your product with Novell, the **Online Update** window appears. If you wish to download available updates for SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2, click the **Run Update** button and click the **Next** button. You will be given the opportunity to select any updates you wish to install. When ready, click the **Accept** button to download and install the updates. After the updates have been installed, click the **Next** button on the **Patch Download and Installation** window. If you choose not to install updates at this time, click the **Skip Update** button and then the **Next** button.

Service

Note: See Section 3.10.6, "Service" in the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual.

45. From the **Installation Settings** window, click the Use Following Configuration button and then click the **Next** button to continue.

Users

Note: See Section 3.10.7, "Users" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual.

- 46. From the **User Authentication Method** window, click the **Local** (/etc/password) button then click the **Next** button to continue.
- 47. From the **New Local User** window, fill in the appropriate information and then click the **Next** button to continue.

Release Notes

Note: See Section 3.10.7, "Release Notes" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual.

48. The **Release Notes** window appears and then click the **Next** button to continue.

Hardware

Note: See Section 3.10.10, "Hardware" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation* and *Administration* manual.

- 49. From the **Hardware Configuration** window verify the information. If correct, click the **Use Following Configuration** button and click the **Next** button to continue.
- 50. From the **Installation Completed** window, click the **Finish** button.

The system will now reboot.

Setting up the Network Install Server

This section provides you with some information on installing SUSE SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2 all in one session over the network. This is helpful for systems administrators who have several machines to install and keep up to date.

Note: For information on setting up a network install server, see the "Installing Add-On Products" section in Chapter 7, "System Configuration with Yast" in the *SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration* manual that resides in the

sles-admin.pdf file in the docu directory of the SLES10 SP2 DVD and see "Chapter 4. Configuration and Installation Options" in *AutoYaST* available at http://www.suse.de/~ug/autoyast_doc/index.html.

In SLES10 SP2, you can create a special add_on_products file that directs YaST to look at additional install sources. You may list a URL to the SGI ProPack 6 SP2 install source in this file.

To create an SGI ProPack 6 SP2 install source, you simply mount the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 CD and copy all of the contents in to a repository. An example of how to do this is, as follows:

```
mkdir /path/to/new-propack-repository
mount /dev/cdrom /mnt
cp -a /mnt/* /path/to/new-propack-repository/
umount /mnt
```

In the add_on_products file that exists in your SLES10 SP2 network repository, you just add a URL pointer to your new target. The URL can be nfs, http, ftp, and so. An example entry for the add_on_products file is similar to the following:

nfs://server/path/to/new-propack-repository

Using AutoYaST

AutoYaST is a tool that allows you to install and configure a system based on control file settings. With AutoYaST, you could install and configure a system over the network automatically. It provides similar functionality to kickstart provided by Red Hat.

You can find information on how to use AutoYaST in *AutoYaST* available at http://www.suse.de/~ug/autoyast_doc/index.html.

You can find information about AutoYaST in Chapter 5, "Automated Installation", of the SUSE Linux Enterprise Server Installation and Administration manual. This resides in the sles-admin.pdf file in the /docu/en directory of the SLES10 SP2 DVD. Documentation is also available in

/usr/share/doc/packages/autoyast2/html/index.html on systems running SLES10 SP2.

Caution: With the initial SLES10 SP2release, add-on-products handling with AutoYaST is extremely problematic and SGI recommends you do not use it.

Upgrading to SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with SLES10 SP2

This section describes how to upgrade from a prior release. It covers the following topics:

Upgrading from an Earlier SLES Base and SGI ProPack Release

Note: The best way to upgrade a system that is running SLES9 and SGI ProPack 4 or previous SLES 10 release is to install both SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2 at the same time (see "Installing SLES10 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2" on page 19).

Updates from SLES 9 to SLES 10 are supported starting from one of the following bases:

- SLES 9 GA (no Service Pack)
- SLES 9 SP3
- SLES 9 SP4
- SLES 10 GA (no Service Pack)
- SLES 10 SP1

Note: Update a system by starting the SLES10 installation system and choosing **Update** instead of **New Installation**.

Upgrading From SGI ProPack 5 SPx or SGI ProPack 6 to SGI Propack 6 SP2

This section describes how to upgrade your SLES 10 SP2 system running the SGI ProPack 5 SP5 release (or earlier) to SGI ProPack 6 SP2 on SLES10 SP2.

During this upgrade, your kernel and several other packages may be upgraded to a newer SLES10 SP2 Online Update version. If you have been keeping up-to-date with SLES10 SP2 online updates, you may already have the newer updated packages installed. The upgrade will work fine in either case.

Caution: Do not use **System Update** to update SGI ProPack. The SLES10 SP2 version of **System Update** is not currently supported by SUSE and will not work correctly.

You need to pay careful attention to the upgrade instructions. If you simply were to mark a pattern for upgrade, you will find only a few packages would be installed. You need to work around a problem in YaST to get the install to proceed properly.

SGI suggests that existing customers upgrade their system from SGI ProPack 5 SPx or SGI ProPack 6 to SGI ProPack 6 SP2 using media because this ensures you get new packages for SGI ProPack 6 SP2. A simple online-update will not automatically offer new packages.

To upgrade from SGI ProPack 5 SPx or SGI ProPack 6 to SGI ProPack 6 SP2, perform the following steps:

- 1. Remove any old SGI ProPack 5 SPx or SGI ProPack 6 install source that may be present. There are several ways to do this. The following example uses the yast command.
 - a. Start the graphical or text version of yast.
 - b. Select **Software** -> **Installation Source**.
 - c. Check for an install source named SGI ProPack 6 for Linux
 - d. If the SGI ProPack 6 install source exists, select it and delete it.
 - e. Select Finish to exit out of the tool.
- 2. Add ProPack 6 SP2 add-on product, as follows:
 - a. Start the graphical or text version of yast.
 - b. Select Software -> Add-on Product.

Note: At this point, you need to select and define your media. This example shows the use of a physical CD.

c. Select CD....

You will be prompted to insert the media.

d. YaST will now add the install source for you.

Note: You will see an error message that states: "An error occurred while connecting to the server. Details: Cannot create the installation source Try again?"

This does **NOT** mean the add-on product failed to add. Instead, this is giving you a chance to enter your authentication information for getting updates/patches from SGI.

e. Answer Yes to the re-try question.

You are now given a chance to set up authentication details

- f. Unselect the **Anonymous** box.
- g. Enter your SupportFolio login name for User name.
- h. Enter your SupportFolio password for Password.

YaST will now add the update source in addition to the ProPack 6 SP2 install source itself.

- 3. You are now software manager. Perform the following steps:
 - Select Filter and then Patterns.

Caution: At this point, do not mark the patterns themselves for upgrade. That will cause the upgrade to not complete properly. See the introductory comments to this section ("Upgrading From SGI ProPack 5 SPx or SGI ProPack 6 to SGI Propack 6 SP2" on page 40).

b. In Text mode, perform the following:

Highlight the SGI ProPack pattern and select OK.

Highlight one of the packages that are part of this pattern (any one will do).

Tab to Actions and hit Enter.

Select All Listed Packages...

Select Update All Unconditionally

Now all the packages in this pattern should have '>' next to them.

c. In Graphical mode, perform the following:

Highlight the SGI ProPack pattern and right-click on any package in the list.

Select All In List and then Update if newer version available

- 4. If you have additional SGI ProPack or REACT patterns to update, go to the Caution in step 3a. and repeat the steps for each additional pattern.
- 5. Select **Accept** to install.

Your system will now be updated.

Upgrading to SGI ProPack 6 SP2 with RHEL 5.2

To upgrade from RHEL 5.1 and SGI ProPack 5 SP5 to RHEL 5.2 and SGI Foundation Software 1 SP2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2, perform the following:

1. Get the software.

If you have physical media, move on to step 2. If not, you will have to download the software from the Red Hat Network and the SGI update server.

You will want to download the following ISO images:

- RHEL5.2-Server-20080430.0-{ia64,x86_64}-DVD.iso
- RHEL5.2-Server-20080430.0-ia64-compat-layer-i386.iso (ia64 only)
- foundation-1sp2-cd1-media-rhel-{ia64,x86_64}.iso
- propack-6sp2-cd1-media-rhel-{ia64,x86_64}.iso

You can download the SGI software from the following locations using a web browser or wget command:

- https://update.sgi.com/sfs/1/sp2/rhel/ia64/images/
- https://update.sgi.com/pp/6/sp2/rhel/ia64/images/

You will need to provide your Supportfolio login name and password to access the software on the SGI update server.

Save the ISO images in a location that will be easy to remember, such as, /opt/sgi/iso.

2. Mount the ISO images.

If your system is already setup to access software on the Red Hat Network (RHN), it will not be necessary to mount the RHEL5.2 ISO images. Skip to section 2b., below.

a. Mount the RHEL ISO images (ia64 example), as follows:

```
# mkdir /var/rhel5.2-dvd
# mkdir /var/rhel5.2-compat
```

```
# mount -ro loop /opt/sgi/iso/RHEL5.2-Server-20080430.0-ia64-DVD.iso /var/rhel5.2-dvd
# mount -ro loop /opt/sgi/iso/RHEL5.2-Server-20080430.0-ia64-compat-layer-i386.iso
/var/rhel5.2-compat
```

b. Mount the SGI ISO images (ia64 example), as follows:

```
# mkdir /var/sfs1sp2-cd
# mkdir /var/pp6sp2-cd
```

```
# mount -ro loop /opt/sgi/iso/foundation-1sp2-cd1-media-rhel-ia64.iso /var/sfs1sp2-cd
# mount -ro loop /opt/sgi/iso/propack-6sp2-cd1-media-rhel-ia64.iso /var/pp6sp2-cd
```

3. Setup local repositories.

If your system is already setup to access software on RHN, it will not be necessary to setup a local repository for RHEL software. Skip to section 3.b., below.

a. Setup RHEL5.2 repositories.

```
# touch /etc/yum.repos.d/rhel5.2.repo
```

Copy the following information into /etc/yum.repos.d/rhel5.2:

```
[rhe15.2-dvd]
name=Red Hat Enterprise Linux $releasever - $basearch - DVD
baseurl=file:///var/rhe15.2-dvd/Server
enabled=1
gpgcheck=1
gpgcheck=1
gpgkey=file:///etc/pki/rpm-gpg/RPM-GPG-KEY-redhat-release

[rhe15.2-compat]
name=Red Hat Enterprise Linux $releasever - $basearch - Compat CD
baseurl=file:///var/rhe15.2-compat/Server
enabled=1
gpgcheck=1
```

```
gpgkey=file:///etc/pki/rpm-gpg/RPM-GPG-KEY-redhat-release
```

b. Setup SGI software repositories.

```
# touch /etc/yum.repos.d/sfs1sp2-cd.repo
# touch /etc/yum.repos.d/pp6sp2-cd.repo
```

Copy the following information into

```
/etc/yum.repos.d/sfs1sp2-cd.repo:
[sfs1sp2-cd]
name=SGI Foundation Software 1 SP2 - $basearch
baseurl=file:///var/sfs1sp2-cd/RPMS
enabled=1
gpgcheck=1
gpgkey=file:///var/sfs1sp2/RPM-GPG-KEY-sgi
```

Copy the following information into /etc/yum.repos.d/pp6sp2-cd.repo:

```
[pp6sp2-cd]
name=SGI ProPack 6 SP2 - $basearch
baseurl=file:///var/pp6sp2-cd/RPMS
enabled=1
gpgcheck=1
gpgkey=file:///var/pp6sp2-cd/RPM-GPG-KEY-sgi
```

4. Check the YUM repository setup.

Run the following commands to clean the YUM cache and to ensure that your new local repositories are setup correctly. You should see a large number of updates:

```
# yum clean all
# yum check-update
```

5. Upgrade existing software.

Run the following command to upgrade the packages installed on the system.

```
# yum -y upgrade
```

Leave off the -y option if you want to confirm the packages that YUM will upgrade. If you would like to save a log of the upgrade process to allow for line by line confirmation at a later time, run the following command:

```
# script -c 'yum -y upgrade' -t /root/pp5-to-pp6-upgrade.log
```

6. Install additional components.

Since the previous 'yum -y upgrade' command will only upgrade packages already installed on the system, you must run some additional yum commands in order to install any new packages introduced in the new versions of the software. Run the following command to show which groups are available for installation and which are already installed:

yum grouplist

Since the SGI Foundation Software product is new, it is unlikely that those groups would be listed as already installed. To install the 'SGI Foundation Software' and 'SGI React' groups, for example, run the following command:

yum groupinstall 'SGI Foundation Software' 'SGI React'

7. Reboot

In order to start using the updated kernel in the RHEL5.2 release as well as the newer SGI Foundation Software and SGI ProPack kernel modules built for the RHEL5.2 release, you should reboot the system, as follows:

reboot

Installing RHEL 5.2 and SGI ProPack 6 SP2

This section describes how to install Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5.2 (RHEL 5.2) and SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2. There are several ways to install SGI ProPack 6 sp2 for RHEL 5.2. The following example shows how to install it in graphical mode, which is the easiest method.

Note: It is also possible to install SGI ProPack 6 sp2 for RHEL 5.2 using yum in text mode. See the README-yum-install file in the docs directory of the SGI ProPack 6 Service Pack 2 CD.

- 1. To install RHEL 5, see Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5 *Installation Guide for x86, Itanium, AMD64, and Intel Extended Memory 64 Technology (Intel EM64T)*
- 2. If you are not using a VGA display, this example assumes that you have a workstation running UNIX and can display X11 graphics. You should connect from your workstation to the target server with ssh using the -x option to pass along graphics to your desktop like this:

ssh -x root@name-of-host

- 3. Make sure you have registered with RHN, that is, Red Hat Network. If you are not registered, perform this command, as follows:
 - # /usr/bin/rhn_register
- 4. Insert the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 CD into your CD-ROM and enter the following command to mount the CD:
 - # mount /dev/cdrom /mnt
- 5. Change directory to the /mnt directory, as follows:
 - # cd /mnt
- 6. Run the install script, as follows:
 - # ./INSTALL

7. Check the box just to the left of SGI ProPack and then click the **FORWARD** button to continue.

A screen may appear (if you have not pre-installed sysstat), as follows:

Dependences Added

. . .

Will continue in 20 seconds.

You can wait the 20 seconds or click the Continue button.

8. When installation completes, a screen appears, as follows:

The software was successfully installed.

9. Click on the **CLOSE** button to close this screen.

Software provided by SGI for the SGI ProPack 6 for Linux Service Pack 2 (SP2) release consists of kernel modules for SGI software built against the kernels in SUSE Linux Enterprise Server 10 Service Pack 2 (SLES10 SP2) or Red Hat Enterprise Linux 5.2 (RHEL 5.2) and value-add software developed by SGI specifically to run on SGI Altix or SGI

Altix XE systems and some additional third-party software (see VTune, in the first row of the table, below).

Operating System Enhancements

Building on the Linux operating system's rapid expansion and improvements for general commercial and enterprise environments, SGI has focused on improving Linux capabilities and performance specifically for high performance computing's (HPC's) big compute and big data environments. Thus, SGI has leveraged its experience with NUMAflex and HPC from its IRIX operating systems and MIPS processor-based systems and concentrated on the Linux kernel improvements specifically important to HPC environments.

Cpuset Support

The cpuset facility is primarily a workload manager tool permitting a system administrator to restrict the number of processors and memory resources that a process or set of processes may use. A cpuset defines a list of CPUs and memory nodes. A process contained in a cpuset may only execute on the CPUs in that cpuset and may only allocate memory on the memory nodes in that cpuset. Essentially, cpusets provide you with a CPU and memory containers or "soft partitions" within which you can run sets of related tasks. Using cpusets on an SGI Altix system improves cache locality and memory access times and can substantially improve an applications performance and runtime repeatability. Restraining all other jobs from using any of the CPUs or memory resources assigned to a critical job minimizes interference from other jobs on the system. For example, Message Passing Interface (MPI) jobs frequently consist of a number of threads that communicate using message passing interfaces. All threads need to be executing at the same time. If a single thread loses a CPU, all threads stop making forward progress and spin at a barrier. Cpusets can eliminate the need for a gang scheduler.

Cpusets are represented in a hierarchical virtual file system. Cpusets can be nested and they have file-like permissions.

In addition to their traditional use to control the placement of jobs on the CPUs and memory nodes of a system, cpusets also provide a convenient mechanism to control the use of Hyper-Threading Technology.

For detailed information on cpusets, see Chapter 6, "Cpusets on SGI ProPack 6 for Linux" in the *Linux Resource Administration Guide*.

Comprehensive System Accounting (CSA)

The port of Comprehensive System Accounting (CSA) software packages from IRIX to Linux is the result of an open source collaboration between SGI and Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) to provide jobs-based accounting of per-task resources and disk usage for specific login accounts on Linux systems.

Providing extensive system accounting capabilities is often important for very large systems, especially when the system will be shared or made available for other organizations to use. CSA uses a Job Containers feature, which provides on Linux the notion of a job. A job is an inescapable container and a collection of processes that enables CSA to track resources for any point of entry to a machine (for example, interactive login, cron job, remote login, batched workload, and so on).

The Linux CSA application interface library allows software applications to manipulate and obtain status about Linux CSA accounting methods.

CSA on Linux is an SGI open source project, also available from the following location:

Partitioning

SGI provides the ability to divide a single SGI Altix system into a collection of smaller system partitions. Each partition runs its own copy of the operating system kernel and has its own system console, root filesystem, IP network address, and physical memory. All partitions in the system are connected via the SGI high-performance NUMAlink interconnect, just as they are when the system is not partitioned. Thus, a partitioned system can also be viewed as a cluster of nodes connected via NUMAlink.

Benefits of partitioning include fault containment and the ability to use the NUMAlink interconnect and global shared memory features of the SGI Altix to provide high-performance clusters.

For further documentation and details on partitioning, see the *Linux Configuration and Operations Guide*.

I/O Subsystems

Although some HPC workloads might be mostly CPU bound, others involve processing large amounts of data and require an I/O subsystem capable of moving data between memory and storage quickly, as well as having the ability to manage large storage farms effectively. The XFS filesystem, XVM volume manager, and data migration facilities were leveraged from IRIX and ported to provide a robust, high-performance, and stable storage I/O subsystem on Linux. Persistent IP Addressing of Ethernet Interfaces

An Ethernet interface can be given a persistent internet addresses by associating its permanent MAC address, such as 08:00:69:13:f1:aa, with an internet protocol (IP) address, for example 192.168.20.1. An interface with a persistent IP address will be given the same IP address each time the system is booted. For more information, see "Persistent Network Interface Names" in the *Linux Configuration and Operations Guide*.

PCI Domain Support for SGI Altix 450 and 4700 Systems

On an SGI Altix 450 and 4700 system, a *PCI domain* is a functional entity that includes a root bridge, subordinate buses under the root bridge, and the peripheral devices it controls. Separation, management, and protection of PCI domains is implemented and controlled by system software. For more information, see "PCI Domain Support for SGI Altix 450 and 4700 Systems" in the *Linux Configuration and Operations Guide*.

XSCSI Naming Systems on SGI ProPack Systems

The XSCSI subsystem on SGI ProPack 4 systems was an I/O infrastructure that leveraged technology from the IRIX operating system to provide more robust error handling, failover, and storage area network (SAN) infrastructure support, as well as long-term, large system performance tuning. This subsystem is not necessary for SGI ProPack 6 SP1 systems. However, XSCSI naming is available on SGI ProPack 6 SP1 systems. For more information, see "XSCSI Naming Systems on SGI ProPack Systems" in the *Linux Configuration and Operations Guide*.

XFS Filesystem

The SGI XFS filesystem provides a high-performance filesystem for Linux. XFS is an open-source, fast recovery, journaling filesystem that provides direct I/O support, space preallocation, access control lists, quotas, and other commercial file system features. Although other filesystems are available on Linux, performance tuning and improvements leveraged from IRIX make XFS particularly well suited for large data and I/O workloads commonly found in HPC environments.

For more information on the XFS filesystem, see XFS for Linux Administration.

XVM Volume Manager

The SGI XVM Volume Manager provides a logical organization to disk storage that enables an administrator to combine underlying physical disk storage into a single logical unit, known as a logical volume. Logical volumes behave like standard disk partitions and can be used as arguments anywhere a partition can be specified.

A logical volume allows a filesystem or raw device to be larger than the size of a physical disk. Using logical volumes can also increase disk I/O performance because a volume can be striped across more than one disk. Logical volumes can also be used to mirror data on different disks.

This release adds a new XVM multi-host failover feature. For more information on this new feature and XVM Volume Manager in general, see the XVM Volume Manager Administrator's Guide.

HPC Application Tools and Support

SGI has ported HPC libraries, tools, and software packages from IRIX to Linux to provide a powerful, standards-based system using Linux and Itanium 2-based solutions for HPC environments. The following sections describe some of these tools, libraries, and software.

Message Passing Toolkit

The SGI Message Passing Toolkit (MPT) provides industry-standard message passing libraries optimized for SGI computers. On Linux, MPT contains MPI and SHMEM APIs, which transparently utilize and exploit the low-level capabilities within SGI hardware, such as memory mapping within and between partitions for fast memory-to-memory transfers and the hardware memory controller's fetch operation (fetchop) support. Fetchops and other shared memory techniques enable ultra fast communication and synchronization between MPI processes in a parallel application.

MPI jobs can be launched, monitored, and controlled across a cluster or partitioned system using the SGI Array Services software. Array Services provides the notion of an array session, which is a set of processes that can be running on different cluster nodes or system partitions. Array Services is implemented using Process Aggregates (PAGGs), which is a kernel module that provides process containers. PAGGs has been open-sourced by SGI for Linux.

For more information on the Message Passing Toolkit, see the *Message Passing Toolkit* (MPT) User's Guide.

MVAPICH2 and OpenMPI

SGI no longer ships any open source MPI packages via the SGI Propack for Linux release. MVAPICH2 and OpenMPI RPMs are available as a courtesy, via the cool downloads section on Supportfolio.

These RPMs are IB interconnect, Intel compiler compiled versions of the open source products.

SGI MPT is provided with the SGI Propack 6 release and supports all SGI platforms.

Performance Co-Pilot

The SGI Performance Co-Pilot software was ported from IRIX to Linux to provide a collection of performance monitoring and performance management services targeted at large, complex systems. Integrated with the low-level performance hardware counters and with MPT, Performance Co-Pilot provides such services as CPU, I/O, and networking statistics; visualization tools; and monitoring tools.

For more information on Performance Co-Pilot, see the *Performance Co-Pilot for IA-64 Linux User's and Administrator's Guide.*

Reconfigurable Application-Specific Computing

The RASC program leverages more than 20 years of SGI experience accelerating algorithms in hardware. Rather than using relatively fixed implementations, such as graphics processing units (GPUs), RASC uses field programmable gate array (FPGA) technology to develop a full-featured reconfigurable computer. The RASC program also addresses the ease of use and performance issues present in typical reconfigurable computer environments.

To address performance issues, RASC connects FPGAs into the NUMAlink fabric making them a peer to the microprocessor and providing both high bandwidth and low latency. By attaching the FPGA devices to the NUMAlink interconnect, RASC places the FPGA resources inside the coherency domain of the computer system. This placement allows the FPGAs extremely high bandwidth (up to 6.4GB/s/FPGA), low latency, and hardware barriers. These features enable both extreme performance and scalability. The RASC product also provides system infrastructure to manage and reprogram the contents of the FPGA quickly for reuse of resources.

Both block DMA and stream DMA are supported. For more information, see Chapter 5, "Direct I/O" in the *Reconfigurable Application-Specific Computing User's Guide.*

RASC hardware implementation for SGI Altix 4700 systems is based on blade packaging. The new RASC blade has high-performance FPGAs with 200K logic cells and increased memory resources with 10 synchronous static RAM dual in-line memory modules (SSRAM DIMMs). For legacy systems, optional brick packaging is available for the latest blade-based RASC hardware.

RASC defines a set of APIs through the RASC Abstraction Layer (RASCAL). The abstraction layer can abstract the hardware to provide deep and wide scaling or direct and specific control over each hardware element in the system. In addition RASC provides a FPGA-aware version of GNU Debugger (GDB) that is based on the standard Linux version of GDB with extensions for managing multiple FPGAs. The RASC debug environment does not require learning new tool sets to quickly debug an accelerated application.

RASC supports the common hardware description languages (HDLs) for generating algorithms. RASC provides templates for Verilog- and VHDL-based algorithms. Several 3rd-party high-level language tool vendors are developing RASC interfaces and templates to use in place of traditional hardware design languages.

The "Getting Started with RASC Programming" section in chapter 1 or the *Reconfigurable Application-Specific Computing User's Guide* provides an overview of FPGA programming.

The RASC tutorial (see "Tutorial Overview" in Chapter 7) steps you through the entire RASC design flow: integrating the algorithm with core service; simulating behavior on the algorithm interfaces; synthesizing the algorithm code; generating a bitstream; transferring that bitstream and metadata to the Altix platform; executing an application; and using GDB to debug an application on the Altix system and FPGA simultaneously.

For detailed information on the SGI RASC program, see the *Reconfigurable Application-Specific Computing User's Guide*.

Extensible Firmware Interface (EFI)

The Extensible Firmware Interface (EFI), a supporting platform to provide input to the CPU and to handle its output, is provided by SLES10, the base Linux operating system for SGI Altix systems running SGI ProPack 6 SP1. EFI also controls the server's boot configuration, maintaining the boot menu in durable, non-volatile memory.

SLES10 uses elilo package which places the bootloader (elilo.efi) and configuration file (elilo.conf) in the /boot/efi/efi/SuSE/ directory on SGI Altix systems.

Note: When booting from SLES10 CDs, use the bootia64 command instead of elilo. Once the system is running SLES10, use elilo to boot from EFI.

Note: If you have installed multiple kernel images and want to boot with one that is not currently the system default (vmlinuz in /boot/efi/efi/SuSE), simply copy the vmlinuz and initrd files for the kernel you wish to use from /boot to /boot/efi/efi/SuSE.

SGIconsole

SGIconsole is a combination of hardware and software that provides console management and allows monitoring of multiple SGI servers running the IRIX operating system and SGI ProPack for Linux. These servers include SGI partitioned systems and large, single-system-image servers, including SGI Altix 350 and 450 systems and the SGI Altix 3000 and 4000 family of servers and superclusters.

SGIconsole consists of an 1U rackmountable SGI server based on the Intel Pentium processor, a serial multiplexer or Ethernet hub, and a software suite that includes the Console Manager package and Performance Co-Pilot, which provides access to common remote management tools for hardware and software.

Console Manager is a graphical user interface for the SGIconsole management and monitoring tool used to control multiple SGI servers. SGIconsole also has a command line interface. For more information on SGIconsole, see the SGIconsole Start Here.

NUMA Data Placement Tools

This section describes the commands that are currently provided with the collection of NUMA related data placement tools that can help you with tuning applications on your system.

Note: Performance tuning information for single processor and multiprocessor programs resides in *Linux Application Tuning Guide*.

dlook Command

The dlook(1) command displays the memory map and CPU use for a specified process. The following information is printed for each page in the virtual address space of the process:

- The object that owns the page (file, SYSV shared memory, device driver, and so on)
- Type of page (RAM, FETCHOP, IOSPACE, and so on)
- If RAM memory, the following information is supplied:
 - Memory attributes (SHARED, DIRTY, and so on)
 - Node on which that the page is located
 - Physical address of page (optional)

Optionally, the amount of elapsed CPU time that the process has executed on each physical CPU in the system is also printed.

dplace Command

The dplace(1) command binds a related set of processes to specific CPUs or nodes to prevent process migrations. In some cases, this tool improves performance because of the occurrence of a higher percentage of memory accesses to the local node.

taskset Command

The taskset(1) command is used to set or retrieve the CPU affinity of a running process given its PID or to launch a new command with a given CPU affinity. CPU affinity is a scheduler property that "bonds" a process to a given set of CPUs on the system. The Linux scheduler will honor the given CPU affinity and the process will not run on any other CPUs. Note that the Linux scheduler also supports natural CPU affinity; the scheduler attempts to keep processes on the same CPU as long as practical for

performance reasons. Therefore, forcing a specific CPU affinity is useful only in certain applications.

For more information on NUMA tools, see Chapter 5, "Data Placement Tools" in the *Linux Application Tuning Guide*.

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
