System Overview




Figure 1-1 SGI Rackable C2112-4RP4 Server

The SGI Rackable C2112-4RP4 server is a 2U rackmount server (see Figure 1-1). It has two main subsystems: the 2U server chassis and four dual-processor serverboards.

This chapter describes the main features and configuration options of the server as well as the components pertinent to monitoring and maintaining your server.

Server Components




Figure 1-2 Overhead View of Server with the Top Cover Removed

The C2112-4RP4 server has four compute nodes in the chassis. Figure 1-2 provides an overhead view of the server with the top cover removed.




Figure 1-3 12-HDD Configuration




Figure 1-4 16-HDD Configuration




Figure 1-5 Compute Node Numbering (Rear View)




Figure 1-6 Compute Node-HDD Mapping for the 12-HDD Configuration




Figure 1-7 Compute Node-HDD Mapping for the 16-HDD Configuration




Figure 1-8 Front Control Panels




Figure 1-9 Front Control Panel Components




Figure 1-10 Back Panel of Compute Nodes

System Safety

This chapter describes basic safety precautions.

Electrical Safety Precautions

Basic electrical safety precautions should be followed to protect yourself from harm and the SGI Rackable C2112-4RP4 system from damage, as follows:

- Be aware of the locations of the power on/off switch on the chassis as well as the room's emergency power-off switch, disconnection switch or electrical outlet. If an electrical accident occurs, you can then quickly remove power from the system.
- Do not work alone when working with high voltage components.
- Power should always be disconnected from the system when removing or installing main system components, such as the serverboard, memory modules and disk drives. When disconnecting power, you should first power down the operating system first and then unplug the power cords. The unit has more than one power supply cord. Disconnect two power supply cords before servicing to avoid electrical shock.
- When working around exposed electrical circuits, another person who is familiar with the power-off controls should be nearby to switch off the power if necessary.
- Use only one hand when working with powered-on electrical equipment. This is to avoid making a complete circuit, which will cause electrical shock. Use extreme caution when using metal tools, which can easily damage any electrical components or circuit boards they come into contact with.
- Do not use mats designed to decrease static electrical discharge as protection from electrical shock. Instead, use rubber mats that have been specifically designed as electrical insulators.
- The power supply power cords must include a grounding plug and must be plugged into grounded electrical outlets.

• Serverboard Battery




Figure 2-1 Installing the Onboard Battery

Caution: There is a danger of explosion if the onboard battery is installed upside down, which will reverse its polarites (see Figure 2-1). This battery must be replaced only with the same or an equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Dispose of used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.

• Mainboard replaceable soldered-in fuses: Self-resetting PTC (Positive Temperature Coefficient) fuses on the mainboard must be replaced by trained service technicians only. The new fuse must be the same or equivalent as the one replaced. Contact technical support for details and support.

General Safety Precautions

Follow these rules to ensure general safety:

- Keep the area around the SGI Rackable C2112-4RP4 system clean and free of clutter.
- The SGI Rackable C2112-4RP4 system might approach 100 lbs (45 kg) when fully loaded. When lifting the system, two people at either end should lift slowly with their feet spread out to distribute the weight. Always keep your back straight and lift with your legs.
- Place the chassis top cover and any system components that have been removed away from the system or on a table so that they won't accidentally be stepped on.
- While working on the system, do not wear loose clothing such as neckties and unbuttoned shirt sleeves, which can come into contact with electrical circuits or be pulled into a cooling fan.
- Remove any jewelry or metal objects from your body, which are excellent metal conductors
 that can create short circuits and harm you if they come into contact with printed circuit
 boards or areas where power is present.
- After accessing the inside of the system, close the system back up and secure it to the rack unit with the retention screws after ensuring that all connections have been made.

ESD Precautions



Caution: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) is generated by two objects with different electrical charges coming into contact with each other. An electrical discharge is created to neutralize this difference, which can damage electronic components and printed circuit boards.

The following measures are generally sufficient to neutralize this difference before contact is made to protect your equipment from ESD:

- Use a grounded wrist strap designed to prevent static discharge.
- Keep all components and printed circuit boards (PCBs) in their antistatic bags until ready for
 use.
- Touch a grounded metal object before removing the board from the antistatic bag.
- Do not let components or PCBs come into contact with your clothing, which may retain a charge even if you are wearing a wrist strap.
- Handle a board by its edges only; do not touch its components, peripheral chips, memory modules or contacts.
- When handling chips or modules, avoid touching their pins.
- Put the serverboard and peripherals back into their antistatic bags when not in use.
- For grounding purposes, make sure your computer chassis provides excellent conductivity between the power supply, the case, the mounting fasteners and the serverboard.

System Operation and Monitoring




Figure 3-1 Front Control Panels

As shown in Figure 3-1, there are two front control panels. There are several LEDs on the control panel as well as others on the hard drive carriers and power supplies. The LEDs keep you constantly informed of the overall status of the system as well as the activity and health of specific components. There are also two sets of control buttons on each chassis control panel to control the four compute nodes. This chapter describes the buttons and LEDs.




Figure 3-2 Control Panel Components

Each control panel contains two sets of node control buttons and status LEDs. Figure 3-2 shows the components of a control panel.

Notes:

- Blink rate is ~1 Hz at 50% duty cycle.
- It is also off when the system is powered off (S5) or in a sleep state (S1).
- The power LED sleep indication is maintained on standby by the chipset. If the system is powered down without going through the BIOS, the LED state in effect at the time of power off is restored when the system is powered on until the BIOS clear it.
- If the system is not powered down normally, it is possible the Power LED will blink at the same time the system status LED is off due to a failure or configuration change that prevents the BIOS from running.

Hard Disk Drive (HDD) LEDs




Figure 3-3 HDD Carrier LEDs

Figure 3-3 shows the location of the LEDs for both the 2.5" and 3.5" HDD carriers.

There is a single bi-color LED (green/amber) to indicate the power supply status. Table 3-4 describes the different states of the LED.

Before working with your server product, read the safety information in Chapter 2, "System Safety."

Note: Whenever you service the system, you must first power down the server and unplug all peripheral devices and the AC power cord.

Tools and Supplies Needed:

- Phillips (cross head) screwdriver (#1 bit and #2 bit)
- Needle-nosed pliers
- Anti-static wrist strap and conductive foam pad (recommended)

Left-Right and User Position

All references to left, right, front, top, and bottom assume you are facing the front of the chassis as it would be positioned for normal operation.

Removing the System Top Cover

The server system must be operated with the system cover in place to ensure proper cooling. You will need to remove the top cover to add or replace components inside of the server. Before removing the top cover, power down the server and unplug all peripheral devices and the power cable(s).

Note: A non-skid surface or a stop behind the server system may be needed to prevent the server system from sliding on your work surface.

To remove the system cover, use the following steps:

- 1. Observe the safety and ESD precautions in Chapter 2, "System Safety.".
- 2. Turn off all peripheral devices connected to the server.
- 3. Turn off the server.
- 4. Disconnect the power cord.
- 5. Remove the screws.




Figure 4-1 Removing the System Top Cover

See A in Figure 4-1.

6. Lift upwards from the **B** edge.

See B in Figure 4-1.

Replacing the System Cover

To replace the system cover, use the following steps:

1. Place the system cover onto the chassis and engage the recessed edge at the rear of the cover.




Figure 4-2 Installing the System Cover

See A in Figure 4-2.

2. Put the cover down from the $\bf B$ edge and tighten the screw at the front.

See **B** in Figure 4-2.

Replacing a Common Redundant Power Supply (CRPS) Unit

The system is equipped with two CRPSs for redundancy. Each of them are hot-swappable.

Removing a Power Supply Unit

To remove a power supply unit, use the following steps:




Figure 4-3 Removing the Power Supply Unit

- 1. Carefully push in the latch on the right-hand side of the unit as shown in Figure 4-3.
- 2. Pull the handle of the unit while still pressing the latch.

Installing the Power Supply Unit

To install the power supply unit, use the following steps:




Figure 4-4 Installing the Power Supply Unit

- 1. Align and slide in the unit to the power cage rail as shown in Figure 4-4.
- 2. Push the unit along the rail until the latch locks in position with a click.

Caution: To maintain proper system cooling, use drive carriers with plastic drive blanks to populate drive days that would be otherwise empty.

Installing a 3.5" Hard Disk Drive

To install a HDD into a 3.5" HDD carrier, use the following steps.




Figure 4-5 Installing 3.5" HDD into Carrier

1. Remove the four screws securing the HDD interface bracket and install the HDD with the screws shown in Figure 4-5.




Figure 4-6 Inserting 3.5" HDD into Chassis




Figure 4-7 Installing 2.5" HDD into Carrier




Figure 4-8 Inserting 2.5" HDD into Chassis




Figure 4-9 Removing a Fan Set




Figure 4-10 Installing a Fan Set

Replacing the Backup Battery

The lithium battery on the serverboard powers the RTC for up to 10 years in the absence of power. When the battery starts to weaken, it loses voltage and the server settings stored in CMOS RAM in the RTC (for example, the date and time) may be wrong. Contact your customer service representative or dealer for a list of approved devices.

Warning: Danger of explosion if battery is incorrectly replaced. Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the equipment manufacturer. Discard used batteries according to manufacturer's instructions.

To replace the backup battery, use the following steps:

- 1. Locate the battery on the server board.
- 2. Gently press the metal clip as shown to release the battery.

3. Remove the battery from the plastic socket.




Figure 4-11 Replacing the Backup Battery





Figure 4-12 Removing Inner Member from Slides

RACK INSTALLATION - INSTALL SLIDES TO RACK








Figure 4-15 Installing the Chassis in the Rack






Figure C-1 Attaching Rail Slides to Rack




Figure C-2 Extending Rail Slides




Figure C-3 Attaching Chassis to Rail Slides




Figure C-4 Rail Slide Release Tab

BMC Error Codes
