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### **About This Guide**

SGI installs operating system software and the SGI Foundation software on all SGI  $UV^{^{\text{\tiny M}}}$  3000, SGI UV 300, SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, and SGI UV 100 systems before the systems leave the factory. The operating system software is either Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL) or SLES. In the event of a disaster or system failure, you can use the instructions in this manual to reinstall this software.

This guide does not support the following SGI UV systems:

- SGI UV 20 systems or SGI UV 10 systems.
- SGI<sup>®</sup> UV<sup>™</sup> for SAP HANA<sup>®</sup> appliances. If you have an SGI UV for SAP HANA appliance, do not attempt the procedures in this manual. Please contact technical support if you need assistance with operating system procedures.

# About Installing the Operating System Software, SGI Foundation Suite, and Optional Features

This manual explains how to install the operating system software and SGI Foundation Software (SFS). You can reinstall this software to meet site requirements or you can reinstall in the event of a disaster or a system failure. SGI supports the following operating systems:

- SGI supports Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL) 7.1, RHEL 6.7, SLES 12, and SLES 11 SP4 on SGI UV servers.
- SGI supports RHEL 6.7 and SLES 11 SP4 on SMNs.

After your SGI UV is configured with the operating system software and SFS, you can configure SFS according to your site's needs. For information about SFS components and features, see the following:

SGI Foundation Software (SFS) User Guide

**Note:** SGI recommends that you install new SFS packages as they become available. This pertains to SGI UV servers and to SMNs. Even if your SMNs are installed with the most recent, supported operating system distribution software available and you are no longer upgrading the operating systems, SGI still recommends that you install the latest versions of SFS on your SMNs.

The procedures in this guide were developed as follows:

SGI staff used an SGI UV 3000 system to develop the server operating system installation procedures. The SGI UV 3000 system was the primary test system for this revision. SGI tested the RHEL 7.1, RHEL 6.7, SLES 12, and SLES 11 SP4 installation procedures on this hardware platform. Different operating system levels might behave somewhat differently on SGI hardware.

The SGI UV 3000 system includes a rack management controller (RMC). The SGI UV 3000 system does not include a system management node (SMN).

SGI did not retest this guide's installation procedures on platforms other than the SGI UV  $3000~\rm platform$ .

 SGI staff used an SGI UV 3000 system to develop the SGI Foundation Software 2.13 release installation procedure. SGI requires you to install the SGI Foundation Software on each SGI UV system. You can install the SGI Foundation Software on the SGI UV server and on the SMN (if included) after you install the operating system software.

Past revisions of this manual used other platforms to test this guide's procedures.

If your SGI UV system includes a SMN, install the SMN software and SGI Foundation Software on this node.

# **About Partitioned SGI UV Systems**

You can use the installation instructions in this manual to install RHEL or SLES as a single-system image on an entire SGI UV system. Alternatively, if your SGI UV system is divided into partitions, you can use these instructions to install RHEL or SLES on an individual partition. The installation procedure, including the disk partitioning instructions, is identical for both purposes. For information about partitioning, see the following:

# About Installing the SGI Performance Suite

The SGI Performance Suite is an optional package, but you need to install the SGI Performance Suite if you want to partition your SGI UV system or if you want to use superpages.

The SGI Performance Suite is also required if you want to use any of the following software:

- SGI Accelerate, which includes optimized software libraries and run-time performance tools.
- SGI MPI, which is SGI's high-performance message passing interface environment.
- SGI REACT, which is SGI's hard real-time performance solution.

For information about how to install the SGI Performance Suite software, see the SGI Performance Suite release notes. The release notes reside in a text file in the /docs directory on the product media. After installation, the release notes and other product documentation reside in the /usr/share/doc/packages/product directory.

### **About Installing SGI UV System Software**

SGI installs operating system software, the SGI Foundation Software (SFS), and any additional customer-purchased software on all SGI UV systems before the systems leave the SGI manufacturing facility. The operating system can be one of the following:

- Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL)
- SLES

If your site practices require you to reinstall the software, or if a disaster occurs at your site, you can use the procedures in this manual to reinstall all the factory-installed software. The procedures in this manual assume the following:

- You, the installer, are familiar with Linux operating systems, and you are familiar
  with the operating system software update process. The installation instructions
  describe how to register the operating system installation with the operating
  system software provider to ensure automatic updates. This manual assumes that
  your site wants to use the automatic updates. As an alternative, you can use
  physical media to apply updates.
- You want to reinstall the factory-installed software on the SGI UV server and, if
  present, on the SGI UV system management node (SMN). The SGI UV 3000
  systems and the SGI UV 300 systems do not include an SMN. The SGI UV 2000
  system, the SGI UV 1000 system, and other SGI UV systems can include an SMN.

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 Your SGI UV system is cabled correctly and attached to the network in accordance with your site practices.

There is a specific order in which you need to install software on an SGI UV system. This order is as follows:

1. Install the system software on the SMN, if present.

To install the software on an SGI UV SMN, install the software in this order:

- a. Operating system software, either RHEL 6 or SLES 11. SGI does not support RHEL 7 or SLES 12 on SMNs.
- b. SGI Foundation Software
- c. SGI SMN Software
- 2. Install the system software on the SGI UV server.

To install the software on an SGI UV server, install the software in this order:

- a. Operating system software, which can be RHEL 7, RHEL 6, SLES 12, or SLES 11.
- b. SGI Foundation Software
- c. (Optional) SGI Performance Suite software. This optional SGI product is required if you want to partition your SGI UV system.

If you need to install the system software on both an SGI UV server and on an SGI UV SMN, install the software on the SMN first. In other words, after you install the operating system software, the SGI Foundation Software, and the SMN software on the SMN, then you can install the system software on the SGI UV server.

The operating system installation procedure is nearly identical for both the SGI UV server and the SMN. Use the operating system installation procedures in this manual as a guide when you perform the operating system installations on both the SGI UV server and the SMN. Small differences related to the platforms are noted within the procedures.

# **Gathering Installation Materials and Information**

The following procedure explains how to gather the information you need for the SGI UV server operating system installation session. If you gather the information you need in advance, you can complete the installation more quickly.

Procedure 2-1 To gather installation materials and information

1. Verify your environment.

All SGI UV system installations require you to have physical access to the SGI UV server. In addition to server access, you also need access to the RMC, CMC, or SMN.

Depending on your hardware, you might need additional equipment or specific network connections, as follows:

- For SGI UV 300 systems, make sure that you have access to the rack management controller (RMC) and the DVD drive that is included on the server.
- For SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, and SGI UV 100 computer systems with an SMN, this documentation assumes that the SMN is a factory-installed SMN, which includes Java software. If your SMN hosts a custom Java installation, the procedures in this manual might fail. In addition, this documentation assumes that you can insert DVDs into the DVD drive on the SMN.
- For SGI UV 3000, SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, and SGI UV 100 computer systems without an SMN, plan to attach a keyboard, monitor, mouse, and USB DVD drive directly to the Base I/O BMC on the SGI UV server. Contact your SGI representative and ask for the USB DVD drive with marketing code LSV-DVD-EXT.
- 2. Locate the software DVDs or CDs that SGI sent to you, or download and create DVDs or CDs.

This manual assumes that you have DVDs of the operating system and CDs of the SGI software.

You can obtain the operating system software in one of the following ways:

- In a media kit from SGI. SGI distributes DVD copies of the RHEL and SLES operating system releases.
- As a software download. You can download the RHEL and SLES releases from the Red Hat or SUSE websites and write the software to a DVD.

You can obtain the SGI software from the SGI customer portal. To download the SGI software, complete the following steps:

In a browser window, navigate to the following URL:

https://support.sgi.com/login

The SGI customer portal prompts you for your username and password.

- Download the SGI software that you need. If you install the operating system software, also plan to install the SGI Foundation Software.
- Write the ISO file to a CD or DVD. The instructions in this manual assume that you have hard media. Some procedures explain how to access the release software if you want to install from a network-resident ISO image, but the instructions are not comprehensive. If you wrote downloaded ISO images to your house network and you do not want to write them to hard media, plan to use your network tools to access the software when the procedures instruct you to insert a DVD or CD.
- 3. Plan the order in which to install the software.

If you need to install both the SGI UV server software and the SGI SMN software, plan to install the SMN software first. You can install the SGI UV server software after the SMN software installation is complete.

4. Gather the information that the installer requires.

The installation requires you to provide information about passwords, your public (or house) network, and so on. You can complete the installation more quickly if you gather this information before you begin. Obtain the system configuration information that was used when the SGI UV System was originally configured. The following list shows the information you need to collect:

•	SGI UV server fully qualified domain name (FQDN)
•	SGI UV server hostname
•	SGI UV server IP address
•	SGI UV server subnet mask
•	Site DNS server IP addresses
•	Site search domain

•	Password for the SGI UV server's system administrator (root user) login
,	FQDN of your site's network time protocol (NTP) server
•	IP address of your primary name server

• Fully Qualified Domain Name (FQDN) of the following:

IP address of your secondary name server

- For SGI UV 3000 systems and SGI UV 300 systems, obtain the FQDN of the rack management controller (RMC).
- For SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, or SGI UV 100 systems without an SMN, obtain the FQDN of the chassis management controller (CMC).

For SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, or SGI UV 100 systems with an SMN, you do not need to obtain the FQDN of the CMC.

- For RHEL installations, do the following:
  - Verify your site's Red Hat Networks (RHN) registration status and your Customer Center registration status.
  - Obtain your RHN login.
  - Obtain your RHN password.
- For SLES installations, do the following:
  - Determine the email address you want to use when you register with the SUSE Customer Center.
  - (Optional) Obtain the activation code for SLES components.
  - (Optional) Determine the system name or description.
- 5. (Conditional) Gather SMN information.

Perform this step only if your SGI UV system includes an SMN. SGI UV 3000 systems and SGI UV 300 systems do not include an SMN. SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, and SGI UV 100 systems can include an SMN.

The following list shows the information you need to collect:




Figure 2-1 SGI UV 3000 System Rack

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


Figure 2-2 SGI UV 300 Chassis

If you have an SGI UV 300 system, identify the chassis in the rack and the DVD drive on the chassis. Figure 2-2 on page 12 shows the location of the DVD drive, along with some other equipment, on the SGI UV 300 chassis.

If you have an SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, or SGI UV 100 system, identify the System Management Node (SMN), if present.




Figure 2-3 SGI UV 2000 System Rack




Figure 2-4 SGI UV 1000 System Rack

Figure 2-3 and Figure 2-4 show the location of the SMN in an SGI UV 2000 system rack and in an SGI UV 1000 system rack. The SMN is located either in the top 1U slot between the individual rack units (IRUs) or at the top of the rack.




Figure 2-5 SMN Power Button and DVD Drive

When you begin the installation, instructions direct you to insert the installation DVD into the SMN and press the power button. As Figure 2-5 on page 15 shows, the DVD drive is on the left of the SMN.

7. (Conditional) Attach peripherals to the SMN.

Perform this step if your SGI UV system has an SMN.

Attach a keyboard, monitor, and mouse. The SMN includes USB ports into which you can plug the peripherals.

- 8. Proceed to one of the following:
  - (Optional) To set an administrative password for the local console, proceed to the following:

"(Optional) Setting or Changing an Administrative Password on the System Console" on page 16

SGI does not require that you set an administrative password, but you can do so if you are logged into a direct-attached, local console. After you set this password, you can proceed with the software installation.

 To install the operating system, the SGI Foundation Software, and the SMN software on an SMN, proceed to the following:

 To install the operating system and SGI Foundation Software on an SGI UV server, proceed to the following:

#### Setting or Changing the Password on an SGI UV 300 System Console

The procedure in this topic explains how to set, or change, an administrative password on the console attached to an SGI UV 300 system. A password is not required.

To delete a console password, type the following command, which clears the EFI variables:

```
RMC> power -c reset
```

If you delete the password with the power <code>-c</code> reset command, you need to go back through the setup screens to set it again.

Procedure 2-2 To set or change an administrative password on the console

- 1. Log into the SGI UV 300 system as the root user.
- 2. (Conditional) Shut down the system.

Complete this step if the system is running at this time.

Type the following command:

- # shutdown now
- 3. Log into the SGI UV 300's rack management controller (RMC) as the root user.
- 4. From the RMC, type the following command to reset the power:

RMC> power -s reset

5. Wait for the reset to complete and type the following command to start a console session on the base I/O BMC:

RMC> uvcon

6. On the console's SGI UV 300 series BIOS main menu, press F2.

This action selects to enter setup and select boot options.




Figure 2-6 SGI UV 300 Boot Manager Screen

Figure 2-6 on page 17 shows the SGI UV 300 series BIOS menu options.




Figure 2-7 SGI UV 300 Device Manager Screen

7. On the boot manager screen, select **Device Manager**, and press Enter. Figure 2-7 on page 18 shows the device manager screen.

8. On the **Device Manager** screen, select **Security**, and press Enter.

The following list shows how to navigate the device manager:

- F1 scrolls the help.
- Shift-6(^), v, or arrow keys highlight a selection.

- F9 resets system defaults.
- Enter selects.
- F10 saves.
- Esc exits without saving.
- Plus (+) and minus (-) keys change setting values.
- To exit the console, press CTRL and the right bracket (]) together, and then press q. This sequence drops you to the RMC console.
- 9. On the Security screen, select the Admin Password option, and press Enter.
- 10. In the **Please type in your new password** field, type the new administrative password, and press Enter.

The minimum password length is 6 characters and the maximum password length is 30 characters. The password is case sensitive.

The next time you boot the system, the system will prompt you to type the new password at the end of the boot sequence. The system issues this prompt before the Shell> prompt appears.

- 11. Press F10 to save the change.
- 12. Press Esc twice to return to the boot manager.
- 13. To return to the RMC console, press CTRL and the right bracket (]) together, and then press q.
- 14. Proceed to the following:

# Setting or Changing the Password on an SGI UV 3000 System Console, an SGI UV 2000 System Console, an SGI UV 1000 System Console, or an SGI UV 100 System Console

The procedure in this topic explains how to set, or change, an administrative password on the console attached to an SGI UV 2000, SGI UV 1000, or SGI UV 100 system. A password is not required.

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To delete a console password, type the following command, which clears the EFI variables:

```
system-cmc CMC:r001i01c> power -c reset
```

If you delete the password with the power -c reset command, you need to go back through the setup screens to set it again.

Procedure 2-3 To set or change an administrative password on the console

- 1. Log into the SGI UV system as the root user.
- 2. (Conditional) Shut down the system.

Complete this step if the system is running at this time.

Type the following command:

- # shutdown now
- 3. Log into the SGI UV system's chassis management controller (CMC) as the root user.
- 4. From the CMC, type the following command to reset the power:

```
system-cmc CMC:r001i01c> power -s reset
```

5. Wait for the reset to complete and type the following command to start a console session on the base I/O BMC:

```
system-cmc CMC:r001i01c> uvcon
```

- 6. At the console's **Hit [Space] for Boot Menu** prompt, press the space bar.
- 7. On the boot manager screen, select **Device Manager**, and press Enter.

Figure 2-8 shows the boot manager screen.

8. On the **Device Manager** screen, select **Security**, and press Enter.

The following list shows how to navigate the device manager:

- F1 scrolls the help.
- Shift-6(^), v, or arrow keys highlight a selection.
- F9 resets system defaults.
- Enter selects.
- F10 saves.
- Esc exits without saving.
- Plus (+) and minus (-) keys change setting values.
- To exit the console, press CTRL and the right bracket (]) together, and then press q. This sequence drops you to the CMC console.
- 9. On the **Security** screen, select the **Admin Password** option, and press Enter.
- 10. In the **Please type in your new password** field, type the new administrative password, and press Enter.

The minimum password length is 6 characters and the maximum password length is 30 characters. The password is case sensitive.

The next time you boot the system, the system will prompt you to type the new password at the end of the boot sequence. The system issues this prompt before the Shell> prompt appears.

- 11. Press F10 to save the change.
- 12. Press Esc twice to return to the boot manager.
- 13. To return to the CMC console, press CTRL and the right bracket (]) together, and then press q.
- 14. Proceed to one of the following:
  - To install the operating system and SGI Foundation Software on an SMN, proceed to the following:
    - "(Conditional) Installing the System Software on the SMN" on page 22
  - To install the operating system and SGI Foundation Software on an SGI UV server, proceed to the following:

# (Conditional) Installing the System Software on the SMN

Perform the procedure in this topic if you have an SGI UV 2000 system with an SMN or an SGI UV 1000 system with an SMN.

Perform all SMN software installations from the local console that is attached directly to the SMN. You cannot install software on the SMN from a remote console.

The following procedure explains how to enable local console access and points to the documentation that explains how to install the operating system software on the SMN.

**Procedure 2-4** To enable access to the SMN from the local console and install the operating system software

- 1. Insert the operating system DVD into the DVD drive on the SMN.
- 2. Press CTRL-ALT-F2 to get to tty2.
- 3. Log in as root.

- 4. Type reboot.
- 5. Start the installer.

This step differs, depending on the operating system you want to install, as follows:

- To install a RHEL SMN, on the **Welcome to Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.X** screen, position the cursor at **Install or upgrade an existing system**, and press Enter.
- To install a SLES SMN, on the SLES boot menu, select **Installation**.
- 6. Proceed to one of the following:
  - To install a RHEL 6 operating system, the SGI Foundation Software, and the SMN software on the SMN, proceed to the following:
    - Chapter 4, "Installing a Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL) 6 Platform" on page 49
  - To install a SLES 11 operating system, the SGI Foundation Software, and the SMN software on the SMN, proceed to the following:

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#### Installing the SGI UV System Software on an SGI UV 300 Server

Perform the procedure in this topic if you have an SGI UV 300 server.

Procedure 2-5 To install the SGI UV 300 server software

- 1. Log into the remote management console (RMC) as the root user.
- 2. From the RMC, power-on the server.
- 3. Put the DVD in to the DVD drive in the chassis.

If you are installing the software on a partitioned SGI UV 300 system, put the DVD into the drive in the chassis that includes the base I/O riser for your partition.

4. From the RMC, type the following command to perform a quick reset:

```
# power -s reset
```

The quick reset in this step sets the system to its smallest possible configuration. A later procedure includes a step to reset the whole system.

5. Wait for the system to reset.

The reset is complete when the **RMC**> prompt appears.

6. At the **RMC**> prompt, type the following command to open a console to the shell:

```
RMC> uvcon
```

- 7. At the **SGI UV 300 series BIOS** menu, press F2 to enter setup and select boot options.
- 8. Use the arrow keys to highlight **Boot Manager Menu**, and press Enter
- 9. Use the arrow keys to highlight **UEFI JMicron USB to ATA/ATAPI bridge ...**, and press Enter.
- 10. (Conditional RHEL 7 or SLES 11 only) Select an installation activity, as follows:
  - For a RHEL 7 installation, use the arrow keys to navigate to the Install Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.1, and press Enter.

• For a SLES 11 installation, on the **SUSE Linux Enterprise Server** *x* screen, press Enter to select **Installation** and start the SLES installation.

Procedure 2-6 To install the SGI UV server software without an SMN

1. Notify users that they need to log off.

The software installation process includes a step to reboot the system. If any users are logged in at this time, their sessions end.

- 2. From a workstation, complete the following steps:
  - · Log into the SGI UV server as the root user.
  - Open a terminal window to the SGI UV server.
  - Issue the following command to shut down the operating system:
    - # shutdown now
- 3. Compete the following steps to power off the SGI UV server:
  - In a terminal window, establish a secure connection to the RMC or to the CMC.
     For example:
    - \$ ssh root@hostname

For hostname, specify the following:

- On SGI UV 3000 systems, specify the hostname of the RMC.
- On SGI UV 2000 systems, SGI UV 1000 systems, and SGI UV 100 systems, specify the hostname of the CMC.
- Provide the root user's password when prompted.
- Type the following command to power off the computer system:
  - > power off

If you are installing the operating system on a partition, repeat this step through Procedure 2-6, step 10 on page 27, for each partition.

- 4. Attach a keyboard, a monitor, and a mouse directly to the SGI UV server.
- 5. Attach a DVD drive to the SGI UV server.
- 6. Insert the operating system DVD into the USB DVD drive on the SGI UV server.
- 7. Complete the following steps to power on the SGI UV server:
  - In a terminal window, establish a secure connection to the RMC or to the CMC.
     For example:
    - \$ ssh root@hostname

For hostname, specify the following:

- On SGI UV 3000 systems, specify the hostname of the RMC.
- On SGI UV 2000 systems, SGI UV 1000 systems, and SGI UV 100 systems, specify the hostname of the CMC.
- Provide the root user's password when prompted.
- Type the following command to power on the computer system:
  - > power on
- 8. Press the space bar after the memory test completion message appears.

This message is as follows:

• On SGI UV 3000 systems, a message similar to the following appears:

```
133,126,815,744 bytes of system memory tested OK
```

```
Press [Enter] to directly boot.

Press [F2] to enter setup and select boot options.

Press [F7] to show boot menu options.

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```

• On SGI UV 2000 systems, SGI UV 1000 systems, and SGI UV 100 systems without an SMN, a message similar to the following appears:

```
133,110,038,528 bytes of system memory tested OK Hit [Space] for Boot Menu...
```

- 9. Use the arrow keys to select **Boot Manager**, and press Enter.
- 10. On the **Boot Manager** screen, use the down-arrow key to select or highlight **EFI USB Device**, and press Enter.

Several minutes might elapse before the system begins to boot. A series of question mark characters might appear on the screen during the system boot. This is a known problem, and you can ignore it safely.

- 11. Proceed to one of the following:
  - To install a RHEL 7 operating system and the SGI Foundation Software on an SGI UV server, proceed to the following:

The following procedure explains how to access the server and points to the documentation that explains how to install the operating system software on the server.

Procedure 2-7 To install the SGI UV server software through the SMN

- 1. Log into the SMN as the root user.
- 2. From the system management node (SMN), establish a secure network connection to the chassis management controller (CMC) of your SGI UV system.

For information about how to connect to the CMC, use one of the methods in the *SGI UV CMC Software User Guide*.

3. Open an ssh connection to the baseboard management controller (BMC).

This step differs depending on whether your goal is to install an operating system on an unpartitioned, single system image (SSI) SGI UV system or whether your goal is to install an operating system on a partition of an SGI UV system that is currently divided into partitions, as follows:

- To install onto an unpartitioned SSI, complete the following steps:
  - On an SGI UV 2000 system, type the following command:

```
uv44-cmc CMC:r001i01c> ssh bmc0
```

- On an SGI UV 1000 system, type the following command:

```
uv44-cmc CMC:r001i01c> ssh bmc0i
```

 $\bullet$  To install onto a partition, use the ssh command and specify the base I/O BMC name for the desired partition.

For information about how to select a partition, see the following:

```
SGI Foundation Software (SFS) User Guide
```

For example, to continue the example from the previous step, to connect to P001, type the following command:

```
uv44-cmc CMC:r001i01c> ssh r001i01b00
```

4. Retrieve the IP address of the BMC.

This step differs, depending on your platform, as follows:

 For SGI UV 2000 systems, type the following command to retrieve the IP address of eth2 on the BMC:

```
r001i01b00> ifconfig eth2
```

For example, the following output shows that 128.162.246.190 is the IP address of eth2:

#### BMC:r001i01b00> **ifconfig eth2**

```
Link encap:Ethernet HWaddr 08:00:69:16:82:2B
inet addr:128.162.246.190 Bcast:128.162.246.255 Mask:255.255.255.0
inet6 addr: fe80::a00:69ff:fe16:822b/64 Scope:Link

RX packets:21326174 errors:1250 dropped:2 overruns:0 frame:1248
TX packets:25887 errors:0 dropped:0 overruns:0 carrier:4

Interrupt:60 Base address:0x800 DMA chan:ff
```

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 For SGI UV 1000 systems, type the following command to retrieve the IP address of eth1 on the BMC:

```
BMC:r001i01b00i> ifconfig eth1
```

For example, the following output shows that 172.20.255.254 is the IP address of eth1:

#### r001i01b00i> ifconfig eth1

```
Link encap:Ethernet HWaddr 08:00:69:15:C0:57
inet addr:172.20.255.254 Bcast:172.20.255.255 Mask:255.255.0.0
UP BROADCAST RUNNING MULTICAST MTU:1500 Metric:1

5. Note the IP address of eth2 on the BMC (for SGI UV 2000 systems) or eth1 on the BMC (for SGI UV 1000 systems).

Keep the IP address in a safe place. You need this IP address during the installation session and for future installation sessions.

- 6. On the desktop, click **Computer** > **Firefox**.
- 7. In the Firefox address bar, type the IP address of eth2 (on an SGI UV 2000 system) or eth1 (on an SGI UV 1000 system) on the BMC.

For example:

```
http://172.20.255.254
```

8. On the login screen, log into the system.

On an SGI UV 2000 system, type admin as the username, type admin as the password, and press Enter.

On an SGI UV 1000 system, type root as the username, type superuser as the password, and press Enter.

The system might issue a Java prompt at this point. Address any Java prompts that the system displays.

9. Launch the console.

This step differs depending on whether you want to install software on an SGI UV 2000 or an SGI UV 1000.

On an SGI UV 2000 system, on the Dashboard screen, click Launch.

On an SGI UV 1000 system, on the Altix UV screen, complete the following steps:

- Click Remote Control.
- Click Console Redirection.
- Click Launch Console.
- 10. (Conditional) Enable Firefox pop-ups.

Perform this step if Firefox displays a message about pop-ups.

Perform the following steps:

- Click Preferences.
- Click Allow pop-ups for ip\_address.
- Click Launch again.
- 11. On the **Opening jviewer.jnlp** ... screen, click **OK**.
- 12. On the **Warning Security:** The web site's certificate cannot be verified ... screen, complete the following steps:
  - Check Always trust content from this publisher.
  - Click Yes.
- 13. On the Warning Security: The application's digital signature cannot be verified ... screen, complete the following steps:
  - Check Always trust content from this publisher.
  - · Click Run.
- 14. Launch the virtual media wizard.

This step differs on SGI UV 2000 and SGI UV 1000 systems.

On SGI UV 2000 systems, complete the following steps:  $\ \ \ \,$ 

• In the top-most JViewer menu bar, click **Media** > **Virtual Media Wizard** ....

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- Insert the operating system DVD into the DVD drive on the SMN, or if you are at a remote console, insert the DVD into your local desktop.
- On the **Virtual Media** pop-up, under **CD/DVD Media 1**, complete the following steps:
  - Select the device that corresponds to your DVD drive.
    - Your choice is /dev/device, where device depends on your system. For example, select /dev/sr0.
  - Click Connect to CD/DVD.
- On the **Information** pop-up, click **OK**.
- · On the Virtual Media pop-up, click Close.

On SGI UV 1000 systems, complete the following steps:

- Insert the operating system DVD into the DVD drive on the SMN, or if you are at a remote console, insert the DVD into your local desktop.
- In the JViewer main menu, select **Device** > **Redirect CDROM**.
- On the CD-ROM Selection pop-up, select a drive.
   For example, select /dev/scd0.
- · Click OK.
- 15. In a terminal window, establish a secure connection to the SGI UV server.

For example:

```
ssh root@uv_server_name
```

16. Type the following command to shut down the system:

```
shutdown now
```

This command drops you into single-user mode. Wait for the root prompt (#) to appear.

17. In a terminal window, establish a secure connection to the CMC.

For example:

ssh root@cmc\_name

18. (Conditional) Boot the system.

Perform this step if you want to install software onto an unpartitioned SGI UV system or if you want to install software on an SMN. Do not perform this step if you want to install an operating system on a single partition.

The CMC command you need to boot the system differs slightly, depending on whether you want to boot an SSI or whether you want to boot a partition. The formats are as follows:

• For an SSI, type the following command to boot the system as a single blade:

```
CMC:r001i01c> power -s reset
```

• For a specific partition, type the power command in the following format:

```
power -s reset number
```

For number, specify the partition number.

For example, to boot partitions 1 and 2, type the following commands:

```
CMC:r001i01c> power -s reset p1
CMC:r001i01c> power -s reset p2
```

19. Press the space bar after a message similar to the following appears in the JViewer window:

```
133,110,038,528 bytes of system memory tested OK Hit [Space] for Boot Menu...
```

If you miss the opportunity to press the space bar, and you arrive at the EFI shell, type exit to return to the boot manager.

- 20. Use the arrow keys to select **Boot Manager**, and press Enter.
- 21. On the **Boot Manager** screen, use the down-arrow key to select or highlight **EFI USB Device**, and press Enter.

Several minutes might elapse before the system begins to boot. A series of question mark characters might appear on the screen during the system boot. This is a known problem, and you can ignore it safely.

22. (Conditional) Configure the accelerated boot process. (RHEL platform SGI UV servers only)

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Perform this step only if you inserted a RHEL DVD into the DVD drive on an SGI UV server. Failure to accelerate the boot process can result in boots that last twenty minutes or more on RHEL platforms. You do not need to perform this step on an SMN.

Complete the following steps:

- On the **Press any key for the boot menu** ... screen, press Enter.
- On the GNU GRUB menu, verify that **Red Hat Enterprise Linux** ... is selected, and type e to edit the Red Hat Enterprise Linux commands before booting.
- On the GNU GRUB menu, verify that **kernel** / ... is selected, and type e to edit the kernel.
- At the end of the grub edit > line that contains the default boot options, type
  a space character and then type the following additional boot option:
   ipmi\_si.trydefaults=0

Press Enter when you finish typing the additional boot option.

• On the GNU GRUB menu, type b to boot RHEL with the additional boot options.

- The SGI Foundation Software. If you install RHEL 7 on the server, SGI requires that you install SGI Foundation software 2.12 or later.

**Note:** SGI UV 3000 systems and SGI UV 300 systems do not have SMNs. SGI UV 2000 systems and SGI UV 1000 systems can have an SMN.

SGI supports either RHEL 7 or RHEL 6 on the server, but SGI supports only RHEL 6 on the SMN.

SGI supports either SLES 12 or SLES 11 on the server, but SGI supports only SLES 11 on the SMN.

For the SGI UV server, your goal is to configure the disks according to Table 6-2.

  - Click the **Expert** ... button on the lower right part of the screen, and select **Create New Partition Table**.
  - On the YaST2 pop-up with the message **Really create a new partition table** ..., click **Yes**.
  - Proceed to the next step after you have deleted all existing partitions.
- 4. On the **Expert Partitioner** screen, complete the following steps:
  - Expand Hard Disks.
  - · Select the hard disks you want to use.

- 9. Complete the following steps on **Add Partition on** /**dev**/*disk* screen to configure the swap partition:
  - Under New Partition Size, click Custom Size.
  - Specify 8 GB in the Size field.
  - · Click Next.
  - Under Formatting Options, select Format partition.
  - Under File system, use the pull-down menu to select Swap.
  - Under Mounting Options, select Mount Partition.
  - Under Mount point, use the pull-down menu to select swap.
  - Select Finish.
- 10. On the Expert Partitioner screen, click Add.
- 11. Complete the following steps on the **Add Partition on /dev**/*disk* screen to configure the data partition:

- Under New Partition Size, click Maximum Size.
- · Click Next.
- Under Formatting Options, select Format partition.
- Under File system, use the pull-down menu to select Ext3.
- Under Mounting Options, select Mount Partition.
- Under Mount point, type /data1.
- Select Finish.
- 12. On the **Expert Partitioner** screen, in the **Partitions** tab, examine the disk partitions.

If the partitions match those in Table 6-2 on page 88, click Accept.

If the partitions are incorrect, correct the partition specifications.

If you want a different network configuration, for example if you want to configure DHCP, ensure that the checkbox in this step is checked before you click **Next**. You can use this procedure as a guide and consult the SLES documentation for more specific steps.

- On an SGI UV 2000 without a DVD drive, but with an SMN, complete the following steps:
  - In the top-most JViewer menu bar, click Media > Virtual Media Wizard ....
  - Insert the operating system DVD into the DVD drive on the SMN, or if you are at a remote console, insert the DVD into your local desktop.
  - On the Virtual Media pop-up, under CD/DVD Media 1, complete the following steps:
    - Select /dev/sr0.
    - Click Connect to CD/DVD.
  - On the **Information** pop-up, click **OK**.
  - On the **Virtual Media** pop-up, click **Close**.
- On an SGI UV 1000 without a DVD drive, but with an SMN, complete the following steps:
  - Insert the operating system DVD into the DVD drive on the SMN, or if you are at a remote console, insert the DVD into your local desktop.

- In the JViewer main menu, select **Device** > **Redirect CDROM**.
- On the CD-ROM Selection pop-up, select a drive.
  - For example, select /dev/scd0.
- Click OK.
- 2. Log into the computer as the root user.
- 3. Click **Computer** > **YaST** to start the YaST interface.
- 4. Click **Software > Software Repositories** to start the SLES repository manager.
- 5. On the Configured Software Repositories screen, click Add.
- 6. On the Media Type screen, select DVD, and click Next.
- 7. On the YaST pop-up, click Continue.
- 8. (Conditional) On the Import Untrusted GnuPG Key, click Import.

Perform this step if this is the first time through this process and you need to confirm the security of the SGI digital key.

- 9. On the Configured Software Repositories screen, click OK.
- 10. On the YaST Control Center screen, click Software Management.
- 11. Select View > Patterns.
- 12. Scroll down to SGI Foundation.
- 13. Check the box to the left of SGI Foundation Libraries, Software, and Drivers, and click Accept.
- 14. On the Changed Packages pop-up, click Continue.
- 15. Insert CDs into the DVD drive as directed by the prompts on the **Perform Installation** screen.

If necessary, click **Eject** on the YaST2 pop-up to open the DVD drive. In the **YaST** pop-up, you might need to click **Retry** more than once to read a new disc. You can ignore the graphic representation of the file system that appears in a new window during this step.

16. Close the YaST session.

- 18. In the terminal window, type the following command to reboot the system:

- 19. After the system reaches the EFI shell, in the RMC or CMC command window, type the following command to reset the full system:

# Remote Management Through the ipmitool Command (SGI UV 300 Systems Only)

From a remote console, you can use ipmitool commands to perform typical system operations.

In order for the ipmitool command to work, the remote console must be on the same local network as the SGI UV 300 system. The following shows the ipmitool command format:

ipmitool -I lanplus -H hostname -U ADMIN -P password command

The arguments to the command's parameters are as follows:

Parameter	Meaning
hostname	The hostname of the SGI UV 300 system on your network.
password	The system's administrative password. The factory-shipped, default password is ${\tt ADMIN}.$
command	One of the ipmitool commands.

There many IPMI commands. The commands that SGI supports for SGI UV 300 remote management are as follows:

- power off
- power reset
- power on

## **About Superpages**

Superpages allow you to map large areas of reserved memory into your application. libsuperpages is a library for allocating and mapping SGI UV superpages. For more information, see the libsuperpages(3) man page. If your SGI UV system is partitioned, you can define superpages within a partition.

Superpages are defined in an EFI firmware variable as a kernel boot option. When you enable superpages, you need to boot the system and then the SGI UV reserves the amount of specified memory to be used via superpages. The reserved memory is not available to the operating system for its regular activities. The SGI UV BIOS passes superpage addresses to the superpages driver as an Advanced Configuration and Power Interface (ACPI) device.

The superpages command allows you to test the functionally of an SGI UV system's superpages. The superpages\_define -w command creates superpages0, which is an EFI variable that resides on the chassis management controller (CMC) and defines superpages. You must be a superuser (root) to run this command. After execution, to enable superpages, you need to reboot the system. The system BIOS then reserves the system memory for superpages rather than providing it to the operating system. For a usage statement, enter superpages -h.

## **Examples**

The following examples show the superpages\_define command:

• Example 1. The superpages\_define command's -L option displays valid superpage sizes, as follows:

```
uv-sys:~ # superpages_define -L
Valid superpage sizes:
0x100000000 4G (4294967296)
0x400000000 16G (17179869184)
0x1000000000 64G (68719476736)
0x4000000000 256G (274877906944)
0x10000000000 1T (1099511627776)
```

• Example 2. The superpages\_define -c command displays the available memory ranges for superpage allocation, as follows:

```
uv-sys:~ # superpages_define -c
available memory ranges for superpage allocation:
0x100000000-0x87ffffffff 0x780000000 30G
0x1000000000-0x17feffffff 0x7ff000000 31G
available memory: 61G (63472M)
```

• Example 3. The following command shows the 4G areas of memory that can be used as superpages:

```
uv-sys:~ # superpages_define -p 4G
in /etc/superpages.conf format:
# for pagesize: 0x100000000 4G
size_4G 4G #node0 0x100000000:3 #node1 0x400000000:4 #node2 0x1000000000:4 #node 3 0x1400000000:3
# 14 4G superpages
```

• Example 4. The following command shows the 4G areas of memory that can be used as superpages, but it limits such areas to two per node:

```
uv-sys:~ # superpages_define -p 4G -n 2
in /etc/superpages.conf format:
# for pagesize: 0x100000000 4G
size_4G 4G #node0 0x1000000000:2 #node1 0x400000000:2 #node2 0x1000000000:2 #node3 0x1400000000:2
# 8 4G superpages
```

• Example 5. After you are satisfied with your memory selection, type commands similar to the following to define superpages:

```
uv-sys:~ \# superpages_define -p 4G -n 2 > /etc/superpages.conf uv-sys:~ \# superpages_define -w
```

When you reboot your SGI UV system, the specified areas are superpages.

## **Saving Your Superpage Configuration**

If you reconfigure your system's superpages, the new configuration goes into effect after you reboot the system. To use the same configuration and avoid a reboot, you can save superpage configuration information to an EFI variable. The SGI UV system stores the EFI variable on the CMC, and you can use the efiv command to restore the configuration. The superpages0 variable contains the addresses and lengths of all the superpages.

You can use the efiv command as follows:

• To display the superpage configuration, type the following command:

```
CMC> efiv -p part_num -1 | grep superpage
```

For  $part\_num$ , specify the partition number. For example, specify 0 on an unpartitioned system.

• To save the superpage configuration, type the following command:

```
CMC> efiv -p -s superpage0 2> /dev/null > superpage0
```

• To restore a superpage configuration, type the following command:

```
CMC> efiv -c superpage0
```

• To delete a superpage configuration, type the following command:

```
CMC> efiv -p part_num -d superpage0
```

For *part\_num*, specify the partition number. For example, specify 0 on an unpartitioned system.

## Configuring Security-Enhanced Linux (SELinux) (RHEL Platforms Only)

You can configure SELinux on an SGI UV computer that runs the Red Hat Enterprise Linux (RHEL) operating system. SELinux supports Multi-Level Security (MLS) and Multi-Category Security (MCS) modes. When you configure SELinux, you create an MLS-compliant or MCS-compliant environment on an SGI UV computer system, and you enable SGI MPI programs to take full advantage of all the features that SGI Accelerate provides on SGI UV hardware. For more information about SELinux, see your RHEL documentation.

**Note:** If you are not interested in MLS or MCS, you do not need to configure SELinux. In this case, do not perform the procedure in this topic.

The SLES operating system does not support SELinux.

To obtain help output for the sgi-selinux-configuration command, type the command name, with no options. For example:

## # sgi-selinux-configuration sgi-selinux-configuration Actions -h|--help Print usage -s|--status Return module(s) status -i|--insert Insert policy module -r|--remove Remove policy module -1|--label Label policy files -R -- restart Restart services affected by SGI policies Select target policy modules (default is all) -S | -- services Perform operation on services -D|--devices Perform operation on devices --bigpage --gru --mmtimer --xpmem --procset --arraysvcs

The following procedure explains how to configure SELinux on an SGI UV computer system.

#### Procedure 7-1 To configure SELinux

- 1. Log in as root.
- 2. Type the following commands to load the SELinux software modules from the RHEL distribution:

```
# yum install policycoreutils-python
# yum install selinux-policy-mls
sgi_bigpage 1.0.0
sgi_gru 1.0.0
sgi_mmtimer 1.0.0
sgi_xpmem 1.0.0
sgi_procset 1.0.0
sgi_arraysvcs 1.0.0
```

3. Type the following command to ensure that the modules are loaded correctly:

```
# sgi-selinux-configuration -s
```

If the SELinux software modules are loaded correctly, the command returns a list of the loaded modules.

If the sgi-selinux-configuration -s command returns nothing, then the policy modules did not load correctly. Type the following command to load all SGI policies:

```
# sgi-selinux-configuration -i
```

4. Type the following command to apply security labels to the file system for all kernel modules and services:

```
# sgi-selinux-configuration -1
```

Note that the option to the preceding command is a lowercase L character.

5. Type the following command to restart services:

```
# sgi-selinux-configuration -R
```

6. (Conditional) Repeat the preceding steps on other partitions.

Perform the steps in this procedure again on all other partions if your SGI UV computer is divided into partitions.

The following procedure explains how to install debuginfo packages for SLES.

Procedure 7-3 To install debuginfo packages

1. Subscribe to the appropriate debuginfo channel.

This channel differs, depending on your platform, as follows:

• For SLES 12 debuginfo information, see the following:

2. Type the following command to retrieve the list of repositories:

## Creating Boot Options (SGI UV 300 Systems Only)

SGI supports your ability to install more than one operating system, or operating system release level, on an SGI UV system.

The following procedure explains how to create a boot option so you can boot any operating system.

Procedure 7-4 To create boot options for nondefault operating system boots

1. Use the procedure in the following topic to establish a connection to the RMC and log in:

2. Type the uvcon command.

The uvcon command opens a console, and you need the console open in order to see the shell prompt.

3. Monitor the power-on process.

The power-on takes only a few minutes, but it can take 5 to 10 minutes for the uvcon command to return boot-to-shell progress information.

4. After the power-on process completes, type CTRL-] q to exit the console.

**Note:** The CTRL-] q key sequence closes the uvcon console session.

- When the Shell> prompt appears, type exit to access the BIOS manager.
- 6. Use the arrow keys to select **Boot Maintenance Manager**, and press Enter.
- 7. On the **Boot Maintenance Manager** screen, use the arrow keys to select **Boot Options**, and press Enter.
- 8. On the **Boot Options** screen, use the arrow keys to select **Add Boot Option**, and press Enter.
- 9. On the **File Explorer** screen, complete the following steps:
  - Use the arrow keys to select the disk from which you want to boot, and press Enter.

For example:




Figure 7-1 File Explorer Screen

- Peruse the directory system, from the disk you selected, through <efi> or <sgi>, through <redhat> or SUSE, until you find grub.efi (RHEL) or elilo.efi (SLES).
- Select grub.efi (RHEL 7), elilo.efi (SLES 11), or grubx64.efi (RHEL 7 or SLES 12).

10. On the **Modify Boot Option Description** screen, note that the cursor is at the end of the Input the description field.

Complete the following steps:

- · Press Enter.
- In the **Please type in your data** popup, type a name for this boot option, and press Enter. For example, RHEL 6.6 or SLES11 SP3.
- Use the arrow keys to select Commit Changes and Exit.
- · Press Enter.
- 11. On the Boot Maintenance Manager screen, select Boot Options, and press Enter.
- 12. On the **Boot Options** screen, use the arrow keys to select **Change Boot Order**, and press Enter.
- 13. On the **Change Boot Order** screen, complete the following steps:
  - If they are not already selected, select the boot order entries.
     For example:




Figure 7-2 Change Boot Order Screen

- · Press Enter.
- On the popup that appears, select the boot option you created earlier in this procedure.
- Press the + key to move the recently created boot option to the top of the list.
- Press Enter to commit this step's changes.

- Select Commit Changes and Exit.
- 14. Press the space bar to return to the BIOS manager.
- 15. Notify all system administrators of the current boot order.

SGI supports the ability to change the default boot order, but some system administration tasks might assume that the default boot option is still **EFI Internal Shell**. You might need to change the boot order in order to access the EFI shell in the process of performing other tasks that this chapter describes. If you need to change the boot order, complete this procedure again and select one of the other boot options.

# Creating a Crash Dump File on an SGI UV 3000 Server or an SGI UV 300 Server (RHEL 7, SLES 12, and SLES 11 Platforms Only)

You can request that the operating system write a crash dump file. The file's name includes a timestamp, and the file's location depends on your operating system, as follows:

• For the RHEL 7 operating system, the file is as follows:

/var/crash/127.0.0.1-year.month.day-hour:minutes:seconds

• For SLES 11 and SLES 12 operating systems, the file is as follows:

/var/crash/year-month-day-hour:minutes

**Note:** This topic does not apply to RHEL 6 platforms. The power nmi and power diag commands send backtraces of CPU tasks to the console but do not create a crash dump file.

The following procedure explains how to create a crash dump file.

Procedure 7-5 To create a crash dump file

1. Log in to the SGI UV server as the root user, and type the following commands to enable the kernel crash dump service, kdump:

On RHEL 7 and SLES 12, type the following:

```
# systemctl enable kdump
# systemctl start kdump
```

On SLES 11, type the following:

```
# chkconfig boot.kdump on
```

The SGI Foundation Software package installation process enables kdump by default. If you are unsure of whether kdump is enabled on your SGI UV server, type the preceding commands. You can enable kdump on your server at any time. kdump must be enabled in order to create a crash dump file.

2. (Conditional) Ensure that the uv\_nmi default action is kdump.

Complete this step on RHEL 7 and SLES 12 platforms.

Type the following command:

```
# echo kdump > /sys/module/uv_nmi/parameters/action
```

As an alternative to this command, you could also boot the kernel with the following parameter:

```
uv_nmi.action=kdump
```

3. Send a nonmaskable interrupt (NMI) signal to start the dump.

You have the option to send an NMI from a remote connection or when logged in directly to the RMC, as follows:

• To send the NMI signal from a remote connection, type the following ipmitool command:

```
# ipmitool -I lanplus -H uv1-rmc -U ADMIN -P ADMIN chassis power diag
```

- To send the NMI signal while logged in directly to the RMC, complete the following command sequence:
  - 1. Type the ssh(1) command to connect securely. For example:

```
# ssh root@uv1-rmc
```

Provide the root user's password when prompted. For more information about connecting to the RMC, see the following:

<sup>#</sup> service boot.kdump start

2. Type the following command to send the NMI signal:

RMC> power nmi

4. (Conditional) Open a console to the RMC and to initiate a crash dump capture.

Complete this step on SLES 11 platforms.

Type the following commands:

> uvcon kdb> kdump

On SLES 11 platforms, you can type additional kdb commands at the kdb> prompt. For information about kdb commands, see your SLES documentation.

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
