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About This Guide

This guide provides an overview of the installation, architecture, general operation, and descriptions of the major components in the SGI® Rackable™ C2108-GP5 server. It also provides basic troubleshooting and maintenance information as well as important safety and regulatory specifications.

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Introduction




Figure 1-1 The SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 Server

The SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server is a 2U rackmount server (see Figure 1-1). It has two main subsystems: the 2U server chassis and a dual-processor serverboard.

Server Chassis Features

Table 1-1 describes the main features of the SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server chassis.

System power	The chassis features a redundant ¹ 2000W power supply consisting of two power modules. The system does not need to be shut down when replacing or removing a single power supply module.
Hard drives	The chassis is designed to support eight 2.5" hot-swappable hard drive carriers.
PCI expansion slots	- 8 x PCIe® x16 slots, running at x16 (Gen3/PCIE_1/PCIE_2/PCIE_3/PCIE_4) - 1 x PCIe® x16 slot, running at x8 (Gen3/MEZZ_1/Proprietary slot) - 1 x PCIe® x8 slot, running at x8 (Gen3/MEZZ_2/Proprietary slot)




Figure 1-2 Front Chassis View

Front control panel	The front control panel, shown in Figure 1-2, provides system monitoring and control. LEDs indicate system power, HDD activity, and network activity. A main power button and a reset button are also included.
Rear control buttons and LEDs	For convenience, some of the buttons and LEDs on the front control panel are also on the rear chassis panel. In addition, the rear panel includes LEDs to monitor overheating and power failures. The rear control buttons and LEDs are shown in Figure 1-3
Rear I/O ports	As shown in Figure 1-3, the rear panel includes the following I/O ports: - VGA port - Serial port - Dual 1G SFP+ Ethernet LAN ports - Server management LAN port - Two USB ports
Cooling system	Eight system fans



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Serverboard Features

At the heart of the SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server is a dual-processor serverboard based on the Intel® C612 chipset, designed to provide maximum performance. Table 1-3 describes the major features of the serverboard.




Figure 1-4 Serverboard Block Diagram

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Additional Hardware Components

In addition to the serverboard and chassis, the following hardware components have been included with the server:

- Two passive CPU heat sinks
- Two conventional riser cards
- One Ultra riser card
- A plastic air shroud
- Eight 8-cm system cooling fans
- SAS backplane
- Eight hot-swap 2.5" HDD trays
- Four riser cards
- One rail set

Important: SGI Rackable server systems may sometimes require driver versions that are not included in the original operating system release. When required, SGI provides these drivers on an SGI Driver CD, which may ship with the system, or on the system disk (pre-installed in the factory). For more information on this topic check with your sales or service representative.

System Safety

This chapter describes basic safety precautions.

Electrical Safety Precautions

Basic electrical safety precautions should be followed to protect yourself from harm and the SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 system from damage, as follows:

- Be aware of the locations of the power on/off switch on the chassis as well as the room's
 emergency power-off switch, disconnection switch or electrical outlet. If an electrical
 accident occurs, you can then quickly remove power from the system.
- Do not work alone when working with high voltage components.
- Power should always be disconnected from the system when removing or installing main
 system components, such as memory modules and disk drives. When disconnecting power,
 you should first power down the operating system first and then unplug the power cords. The
 unit has more than one power supply cord. Disconnect two power supply cords before
 servicing to avoid electrical shock.
- When working around exposed electrical circuits, another person who is familiar with the power-off controls should be nearby to switch off the power if necessary.
- Use only one hand when working with powered-on electrical equipment. This is to avoid
 making a complete circuit, which will cause electrical shock. Use extreme caution when
 using metal tools, which can easily damage any electrical components or circuit boards they
 come into contact with.
- Do not use mats designed to decrease static electrical discharge as protection from electrical shock. Instead, use rubber mats that have been specifically designed as electrical insulators.
- The power supply power cords must include a grounding plug and must be plugged into grounded electrical outlets.

Serverboard Battery




Figure 2-1 Installing the Onboard Battery

Caution: There is a danger of explosion if the onboard battery is installed upside down, which will reverse its polarities (see Figure 2-1). This battery must be replaced only with the same or an equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Dispose of used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.

 Mainboard replaceable soldered-in fuses: Self-resetting PTC (Positive Temperature Coefficient) fuses on the mainboard must be replaced by trained service technicians only.
 The new fuse must be the same or equivalent as the one replaced. Contact technical support for details and support.

General Safety Precautions

Follow these rules to ensure general safety:

- Keep the area around the SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 system clean and free of clutter.
- The SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 system weighs approximately 75 lbs (34 kg.) when fully loaded. When lifting the system, two people at either end should lift slowly with their feet spread out to distribute the weight. Always keep your back straight and lift with your legs.
- Place the chassis top cover and any system components that have been removed away from the system or on a table so that they won't accidentally be stepped on.
- While working on the system, do not wear loose clothing such as neckties and unbuttoned shirt sleeves, which can come into contact with electrical circuits or be pulled into a cooling fan.
- Remove any jewelry or metal objects from your body, which are excellent metal conductors
 that can create short circuits and harm you if they come into contact with printed circuit
 boards or areas where power is present.
- After accessing the inside of the system, close the system back up and secure it to the rack unit with the retention screws after ensuring that all connections have been made.
- Do not make improper use of server rack or rail equipment, as noted Figure 2-2.

ESD Precautions



Caution: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) is generated by two objects with different electrical charges coming into contact with each other. An electrical discharge is created to neutralize this difference. The discharge can damage electronic components and printed circuit boards.

The following measures are generally sufficient to neutralize this difference before contact is made to protect your equipment from ESD:

- Use a grounded wrist strap designed to prevent static discharge.
- Keep all components and printed circuit boards (PCBs) in their antistatic bags until ready for use.
- Touch a grounded metal object before removing the board from the antistatic bag.
- Do not let components or PCBs come into contact with your clothing, which may retain a charge even if you are wearing a wrist strap.
- Handle a board by its edges only; do not touch its components, peripheral chips, memory
 modules or contacts.
- When handling chips or modules, avoid touching their pins.
- Put the serverboard and peripherals back into their antistatic bags when not in use.
- For grounding purposes, make sure your computer chassis provides excellent conductivity between the power supply, the case, the mounting fasteners and the serverboard.

Operating Precautions

The following are two noteworthy operating precautions:

- Ensure that the chassis cover is in place when the server is operating to ensure proper cooling. Out-of-warranty damage to the system can occur if this practice is not strictly followed.
- Please handle used batteries carefully. Do not damage the battery in any way. A damaged
 battery may release hazardous materials into the environment. Do not discard a used battery
 in the garbage or a public landfill. Please comply with the regulations set up by your local
 hazardous waste management agency to dispose of your used battery properly.

Server Installation

This chapter provides a quick setup checklist to get the SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server operational.

Unpack the System

Inspect the shipping container used for the server and note if it was damaged in any way. If the server shows damage, file a damage claim with the carrier who delivered it.

Decide on a suitable location for the rack that supports the weight, power requirements, and environmental requirements of the server. It should be situated in a clean, dust-free environment that is well ventilated. Avoid areas where heat, electrical noise, and electromagnetic fields are generated. Place the server rack near a grounded power outlet. Refer to "Warnings and Precautions" on page 14.

Prepare for Setup

The shipping container should include two sets of rail assemblies, two rail mounting brackets and the mounting screws that you will use to install the system into a rack.

Read this section in its entirety before you begin the installation procedure.

Choose a Setup Location

Follow these guidelines:



Caution: The equipment is intended for installation only in a restricted access location.

- This product is not suitable for use with visual display work place devices according to Clause 2 of the *German Ordinance for Work with Visual Display Units* document.
- Leave enough clearance in front of the rack to enable you to open the front door completely (~25 inches) and approximately 30 inches of clearance in the back of the rack to allow for sufficient airflow and ease in servicing.

Warnings and Precautions

Rack Precautions



Warning: Failure to follow the following guidelines can result in serious injury or damage to the equipment.

- The SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server weighs 75 lbs (34 kg). Always use proper lifting techniques when your move the server. Always get the assistance of another qualified person when you install the sever in a location above your shoulders.
- Extend the leveling jacks on the bottom of the rack to the floor with the full weight of the rack resting on them.
- Attach stabilizers to the rack in single rack installations.
- Couple racks together in multiple rack installations.
- Be sure the rack is stable before extending a component from the rack.
- Extend only one component at a time. Extending two or more components simultaneously may cause the rack to tip over.

Server Precautions

- Review the electrical and general safety precautions in Chapter 2, "System Safety."
- Determine the placement of each component in the rack before you install the rails.
- Install the heaviest server components in the bottom of the rack first, and then work up.
- Use a regulating uninterruptible power supply (UPS) to protect the server from power surges and voltage spikes and to keep your system operating in case of a power failure.
- Allow the hot-pluggable SATA drives and power supply modules to cool before touching them.
- Always keep the rack's front door and all panels and components on the servers closed when not servicing to maintain proper cooling.

Rack Mounting Considerations

Ambient Operating Temperature

If installed in a closed or multi-unit rack assembly, the ambient operating temperature of the rack environment may be greater than the ambient temperature of the room. Therefore, consideration should be given to installing the equipment in an environment compatible with the manufacturer's maximum rated ambient temperature (35° C or 95° F).

Note: Certain processor or coprocessor configurations may require more stringent temperature constraints. If this is true for your system, SGI will so notify you.

Reduced Airflow

Equipment should be mounted into a rack so that the amount of airflow required for safe operation is not compromised.

Mechanical Loading

Equipment should be mounted into a rack so that a hazardous condition does not arise due to uneven mechanical loading.

Circuit Overloading

Consideration should be given to the connection of the equipment to the power supply circuitry and the effect that any possible overloading of circuits might have on overcurrent protection and power supply wiring. Appropriate consideration of equipment nameplate ratings should be used when addressing this concern.

Reliable Ground

A reliable ground must be maintained at all times. To ensure this, the rack itself should be grounded. Particular attention should be given to power supply connections other than the direct connections to the branch circuit (for example, the use of power strips, and so on).

Install the System into a Rack

This section provides information on installing the server into a rack. If the system has already been mounted into a rack, refer to "Check the Serverboard Setup" on page 20. There are a variety of rack units on the market, which may mean the assembly procedure will differ slightly. You should also refer to the installation instructions that came with the rack unit you are using.

Note: This rail will fit a rack between 26" and 33.5" deep.

Separate the Sections of the Rack Rails and Install Outer Rack Rails

The chassis package includes two rail assemblies in the rack mounting kit. Each assembly consists of two sections: an inner fixed chassis rail that secures directly to the server chassis and an outer fixed rack rail that secures directly to the rack itself.

Steps 1–4 describe how to separate the inner and outer rails:




Figure 3-1 Separating and Installing the Rack Rails

- 1. Locate the rail assembly in the chassis packaging as shown in Figure 3-1.
- 2. Extend the rail assembly by pulling it outward.
- 3. Press the quick-release tab
- 4. Separate the inner rail from the outer rail assembly as shown in Figure 3-1.

Outer rails attach to the rack and hold the chassis in place. The outer rails for the chassis extend between 30 inches and 33 inches.

Steps 5–8 describe how to install the outer rails to the rack (see Figure 3-1):

5. Secure the back end of the outer rail to the rack, using the screws provided.

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- 6. Press the button where the two outer rails are joined to retract the smaller outer rail.
- 7. Hang the hooks of the rails onto the rack holes and if desired, use screws to secure the front of the outer rail onto the rack.
- 8. Repeat steps 5-7 for the remaining outer rail.

Install the Inner Rail Extensions

The server chassis includes a set of inner rails in two sections: inner rails and inner rail extensions. The inner rails are pre-attached to the chassis, and do not interfere with normal use of the chassis if you decide not to use a server rack. The inner rail extensions are attached to the inner rails to mount the chassis in the rack.




Figure 3-2 Installing the Inner Rail Extensions

Perform the following steps to install the inner rail extensions as illustrated in Figure 3-2:

- 1. Place the inner rail extensions on the side of the chassis aligning the hooks of the chassis with the rail extension holes. Make sure the extension faces outward just like the pre-attached inner rail.
- Slide the extension toward the front of the chassis.
- 3. Secure the chassis with two screws as illustrated.
- 4. Repeat the prior steps for the other inner rail extension.

Install the Server in a Rack



Warning: The SGI Rackable C2108-GP5 server weighs 75 lbs (34 kg). Always use proper lifting techniques when your move the server. Always get the assistance of another qualified person when you install the sever in a location above your shoulders. Failure to do so may result in serious personal injury or damage to the equipment.




Figure 3-3 Installing the Server in a Rack

You should now have rails attached to both the server chassis and the rack unit. The next step is to install the server into the rack (refer to Figure 3-3).

- 1. Extend the outer rails as shown in Figure 3-3.
- 2. Align the inner rails of the chassis with the outer rails on the rack.
- 3. Slide the inner rails into the outer rails, keeping the pressure even on both sides. When the chassis has been pushed completely into the rack, it should click into the locked position.
- 4. Optional screws may be used to secure the to hold the front of the chassis to the rack.

Note: The figure above is for illustration purposes. Always install servers to the rack in a bottom-to-top fashion.

Check the Serverboard Setup

After you install the server in the rack, you will need to open the unit to make sure the serverboard is properly installed and all the connections have been made. Before operating the server for the first time, it is important to remove any protective film covering the top of the chassis. The removal of this film allows for proper ventilation and cooling.

Removing the Chassis Cover




Figure 3-4 Accessing the Inside of the Chassis

Use the following procedure for removing the chassis cover as illustrated in Figure 3-4.

- 1. Ensure that the system is not turned on or connected to AC power.
- 2. If the server is rack-mounted, grasp the two front handles and pull the server straight out until it locks.

You will hear a click when it locks.

Note: To remove the system from the rack completely, depress the locking tabs on the chassis rails (push the right-side tab down and the left-side tab up) to continue to pull the system out past the locked position.

- 3. Remove the 9 screws securing the cover.
- 4. Slide the cover toward the rear of the chassis to disengage the cover.

Checking the Components and Setup

You may have one or two processors already installed in your serverboard. Ensure that the serverboard is populated per your order.

Your server system comes with system memory already installed. Make sure all DIMMs are fully seated in their slots.

Ensure that all power and data cables are properly connected and not blocking the chassis airflow. Also, make sure that no cables are positioned in front of the fans.

Checking the Drive Bay Setup

Ensure that the peripheral drives and the disk drives have been properly installed and all connections have been made.

Do not operate the server without drives or drive trays in the drive bays. Depending upon your system's configuration, your system may have one or more drives already installed. All drives are accessible from the front of the server. If you need to install hard drives, see "Replacing Disk Drives" on page 36. Use only recommended server parts.

Checking the Airflow

Airflow is provided by eight 8-cm chassis cooling fans. The system component layout was carefully designed to direct sufficient cooling airflow to the components that generate the most heat.

Ensure that all power and data cables have been routed in such a way that they do not block the airflow generated by the fans.

Providing Power

Plug the power cord(s) from the power supply unit(s) into a high-quality power strip that offers protection from electrical noise and power surges. It is recommended that you use an uninterruptible power supply (UPS).

Depress the power button on the control panel, located on the front of the chassis. See "Control Panel Components" on page 24.

System Monitoring




Figure 4-1 Front Control Panel

There are several buttons and LEDs on the front control panel and on the rear of the chassis to keep you constantly informed of the overall status of the system. As shown in Figure 4-1, the front control panel is on the left side of the chassis front.

Additionally, drive carriers and power supplies have LEDs that indicate the disk drive and power supply status, respectively. This chapter describes the functions of the buttons and LEDs and the appropriate responses you may need to take.

Control Panel Components




Figure 4-2 Control Panel Components

Figure 4-2 shows the components of the control panel.




Figure 4-3 Rear Control Buttons and LEDs




Figure 4-4 Disk Carrier LED

Notes:

Power Supply LED

There is a single bi-color LED (green/amber) to indicate the power supply status. Table 4-4 describes the different states of the LED.

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Chassis Maintenance

For warranty and safety considerations, SGI designates the following chassis components as customer-replaceable units:

- Power supplies
- Fans
- · Disk drives

The disk drives and power supplies are hot-swappable; that is, you can replace them without powering down the server. As a safety precaution, replacing the fans requires a system power-down. A trained service technician should install and replace all other components.

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Before You Start



Warning: Review the warnings and precautions listed in this manual before setting up or servicing this chassis. These include the items described in Chapter 2, "System Safety."

Tools and Supplies Needed

- Phillips (cross head) screwdriver
- Anti-static wrist strap and conductive foam pad (recommended)

Left-Right and User Position

All references to left, right, front, top, and bottom assume you are facing the front of the chassis as it would be positioned for normal operation.

Removing the Chassis Cover

Caution: Except for short periods of time, do not operate the server without the cover in place. The chassis cover must be in place to allow proper airflow and prevent overheating.




Figure 5-1 Accessing the Inside of the Chassis

Use the following procedure for removing the chassis cover as illustrated in Figure 5-1.

- 1. Ensure that the system is not turned on or connected to AC power.
- 2. If the server is rack-mounted, grasp the two front handles and pull the server straight out until it locks.

You will hear a click when it locks.

- 3. Remove the 9 screws securing the cover.
- 4. Slide the cover toward the rear of the chassis to disengage the cover.

Note: To remove the system from the rack completely, depress the locking tabs on the chassis rails (push the right-side tab down and the left-side tab up) to continue to pull the system out past the locked position.

Replacing a Power Supply

The server chassis includes two redundant 2000-Watt power supplies. An amber light will be illuminated on the power supply when the power is off. An illuminated green light indicates that the power supply is operating.




Figure 5-2 Removing the Power Supply

In the unlikely event that a power supply unit needs to be replaced, one power supply can be removed without powering down the system. Use the following steps to replace a power supply, as illustrated in Figure 5-2:



Caution: .Unplug the AC power cord from the failed power supply module to reduce the risk of injury from electric shock.

- 1. Pull out the power supply handle and press the retaining clip on the right side of the power supply along the direction of the arrow.
- 2. While pressing the retaining clip, pull the power supply out.
- 3. Push the new power supply module into the power bay until you hear a click.
- Plug the AC power cord back into the module.

Note: Certain configurations may not offer a redundant power supply option. Check with your SGI support representative for details about your configuration.

Replacing Disk Drives

Caution: Except for short periods of time while swapping hard drives, do not operate the server with the hard drive carriers empty.




Figure 5-3 Replacing a Hard Disk Drive

To replace an HDD, perform the following steps, as illustrated in Figure 5-3:

- 1. Press the release button on the HDD tray.
- Pull the locking lever to remove the HDD tray.
 Note the drive tray orientation so that you can re-insert it properly.
- 3. Replace the disk drive in the tray.
 - Note the four screws that secure the drive to the tray.
- 4. Slide the drive tray back into the bay until it locks to ensure that the HDD is properly connected to the backplane.

Replacing Chassis Fans




Figure 5-4 Chassis Fans

As shown in Figure 5-4, the chassis contains eight high-performance fans. If a fan fails, the System Status LED on the control panel will shine amber. Replace any failed fan at your earliest convenience with the same type and model. The system can continue to run with a failed fan.

For the replacement procedures in this section, the fans are categorized as following:

- Front and middle GPU fans (GPU34_FAN, GPU12_FAN, GPU78_FAN, and GPU56_FAN)
- System fans (SYS_FAN1 and SYS_FAN2)
- Rear GPU fans (GPU12E_FAN and GPU56E_FAN)

Common Preliminary Steps

Regardless of fan type, perform the following preliminary steps:

 Remove the top chassis cover while the system is still running to determine which of the fans has failed.

- 2. Power down the system.
- 3. Remove the power cord(s).



Caution: Steps 2 and 3 are safety precautions. Failure to observe them could lead to personal injury or damage to the equipment.

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Front and Middle GPU Fans




Figure 5-5 Removing Front or Middle GPU Fan




Figure 5-6 Inserting Front or Middle GPU Fan

After completing the preliminary steps (See "Common Preliminary Steps" on page 39.), perform the following steps to replace a front or middle GPU fan as illustrated in Figure 5-5 and Figure 5-6:

- 1. Disconnect the fan cabling and lift the fan assembly from the chassis.
- 2. Attach the four rubbers on the fan.
- Reinsert the fan assembly and recable it.
 Ensure that the fan cables are seated properly. See "Fan Cabling" on page 46.
- 4. Power up the system and ensure that the fan is working properly before replacing the chassis cover.

System Fans




Figure 5-7 Removing System Fans




Figure 5-8 Inserting System Fans

After completing the preliminary steps (See "Common Preliminary Steps" on page 39.), perform the following steps to replace one of the system fans as illustrated in Figure 5-7 and Figure 5-8:

- 1. Disconnect the fan cabling and lift the fan assembly from the chassis.
- 2. Attach the four rubbers on the fan.
- Reinsert the fan assembly and recable it.
 Ensure that the fan cables are seated properly. See "Fan Cabling" on page 46.
- 4. Power up the system and ensure that the fan is working properly before replacing the chassis cover.

Rear GPU Fans




Figure 5-9 Removing Rear GPU Fans




Figure 5-10 Inserting Rear GPU Fans

After completing the preliminary steps (See "Common Preliminary Steps" on page 39.), perform the following steps to replace a rear GPU fan as illustrated in Figure 5-9 and Figure 5-10:

- 1. Remove the screws securing the fan cage.
- 2. Remove the fan cage from the chassis.
- 3. Remove the screws securing the cage.
- 4. Replace the failed fan and re-insert the fan cage into the chassis.
- 5. With the screws from step 1, secure the fan cage to the chassis.

Fan Cabling




Figure 5-11 Fan Cabling View 1

Caution: To avoid fan cable damage, ensure that the fan cables are firmly seated in the grooves. See Figure 5-11 and Figure 5-12.

If you follow all of the prescribed procedures and still need assistance, check with your authorized support organization.

If the System Does Not Power Up

If the system will not power up when the front power button is pushed, use the following checklist to identify common sources for the problem:

- Make sure that both ends of each system power cable are firmly connected to the power supply and the corresponding power source(s) or power distribution unit (PDU).
- Check that the LED on each power supply is properly lit. The power supply has one status LED located on the left side of the front of the power supply. The status LED has three states as follows:
 - Dark or off—Indicates no AC power present.
 - Yellow—AC power is present. The server is not turned on (no DC power).
 - Flashes slowly (about four seconds on/off)—Power supply has failed.
 - Green—AC power is present and the server is turned on (DC power present).
- Open the system cover, remove the air shroud, and check to make sure that no obvious short circuits exist between the serverboard and chassis.

If you must replace the power supply, refer to "Replacing a Power Supply" on page 34.

System Powers Up But Will Not Boot

If the system powers up but will not boot the operating system, check the following:

- Check the system order document(s) the server may have been ordered with no operating system. If so, check with your system administrator for OS loading information.
- Check the system disk for drive activity and confirm that it is firmly seated in the disk bay. A
 red light on the front of the disk indicates a functional error. Check with your service
 provider or local system administrator.

No Video After System Power Up

If the system powers up and appears to be booting normally but no video is present, try the following basic solutions:

- Confirm your monitor is plugged in and switched on.
- Check all video cables and ensure they are properly connected.
- If using an optional PCIe video card check the back of the card for LED activity or a fault indicator. Try opening the system, reseating the PCI card, and rebooting.

If you cannot get a video signal after trying basic solutions contact your support provider.

Memory Errors

If your system experiences memory related errors, try these basic troubleshooting steps to resolve or better identify the problem:

- Confirm that the power supply LED is not indicating an error.
- Shut the system down, remove the covers over the serverboard and make sure that all the DIMM modules are properly and fully installed.
- You should be using registered ECC DDR4 memory. Also, it is recommended that you use the same memory type and speed for all DIMMs in the system.
- Check for bad DIMM modules or slots by swapping modules between slots and noting the results.

Contact your administrator or support provider if the memory errors continue.

Loss of Power Redundancy with GPUs or Coprocessors

Some GPUs and coprocessors with high-power consumption can cause the system power draw to exceed what a single power supply can provide. In such cases, the server can operate normally because the server has two power supplies. However, the server will not continue to function with one failed power supply.

Power redundancy is retained if you do not exceed the configuration-power maximums described in Table 6-1.

Appendix B

BIOS POST Beep Codes

During Power-On Self-Test (POST) routines, which are performed each time the system is powered on, errors may occur.

Non-fatal errors are those which, in most cases, allow the system to continue the boot-up process. The error messages normally appear on the screen.

Fatal errors are those which will not allow the system to continue the boot-up procedure. If a fatal error occurs, you should consult with your service provider for possible repairs.

These fatal errors are usually communicated through a series of audible beeps. Table B-1 and Table B-2 identify the beep codes and the corresponding errors.
