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About This Document

The 3Dlabs Wildcat 4110 Graphics User's Guide contains information on the setup and use of the Wildcat 4110 and Wildcat 4110 VIO video cards, as well as troubleshooting information, connections, and specifications.

NOTE References to Wildcat 4110 in this document cover both Wildcat 4110 and Wildcat 4110 VIO unless otherwise noted.

If you purchased this card as part of a system, the card was factory installed and configured in your system prior to shipment. This document provides instructions for setting your display parameters and installing the video drivers and hardware in case you bought the card as part of an upgrade or add-on purchase.

The document is organized as follows:

- ♦ Chapter 1, "Introduction," provides an overview of the Wildcat 4110 video card, a list of features, and a brief description of the external ports.

1 Introduction

The Wildcat 4110 video card equips your personal computer or personal workstation with powerful and professional 3D graphics capability. The Wildcat 4110 video card infuses Intel Pentium II or greater computers running the Microsoft Windows NT operating system with workstation-class 3D graphics features and performance.

NOTE References to Wildcat 4110 in this document cover both Wildcat 4110 and Wildcat 4110

VIO unless otherwise noted.

NOTE If you purchased a Wildcat 4110 video card as part of a system, it was preconfigured to

operate in your system before shipment. No other modifications are necessary. Also, your system's video drivers were installed before shipment and are operative when you receive the system. No further installation or configuration is necessary unless you bought a Wildcat 4110 as an add-on or upgrade. Store the driver CD or diskette that came with your system in a safe place in case you ever need to reinstall the drivers.




Figure 1. External Ports

2 Setup

This chapter provides step-by-step instructions for installing the video card and related software, and connecting the monitor and stereo display device.

If you purchased your Wildcat 4110 video card as part of a system, it was installed before shipment, along with its driver software. The instructions in this chapter are necessary only if you purchased a customer kit or need to reinstall your video card or its driver software.

Preparing for Installation

If you are installing a Wildcat 4110 video card, take the following steps to prepare.

Make Sure Your Computer is Ready

General system requirements include:

- ♦ Pentium II or greater processor
- ♦ Microsoft Windows NT 4.0 with Service Pack 4 or later
- ♦ Accelerated Graphics Port (AGP) Pro50 or AGP Pro expansion slot

NOTE Wildcat 4110 cannot plug into a standard AGP slot.

- ◆ An open Peripheral Component Interconnect (PCI) slot adjacent to the AGP Pro50 or AGP Pro slot for cooling purposes
- ♦ 32 MB DRAM minimum (64 MB recommended)
- Industry-standard, multiple-frequency monitor or a DVI-compliant digital display device
- 3 MB of free space on the computer's primary system disk for the driver software

Collect Materials and Tools

Make sure you have the following items:

- ♦ Wildcat 4110 video card
- ♦ Delivery media with the Wildcat 4110 video display driver
- ♦ Flat-head or Phillips screwdriver
- ♦ Monitor cable supplied with your computer or with the monitor
- ♦ Your computer's documentation
- ♦ Grounding wrist strap

Take Anti-static Precautions

Static electricity can damage the components inside a computer or on a printed circuit card. To reduce the possibility of electrostatic discharge:

- Turn off power to the computer.
- ◆ Touch the metal chassis of the computer to drain off static electricity before touching the card.
- Wear a properly connected grounding wrist strap when handling the card or working in the computer.
- Do not wear wool or polyester clothing.
- Work in an area with a relative humidity of at least 50 percent.
- ♦ Keep the card in the anti-static bag until you are ready to install it.
- Handle the card as little as possible and only by the edges.

Installing the Video Card

Refer to your computer's documentation for instructions on opening and closing the system, identifying the AGP Pro50 or AGP Pro expansion slot, identifying Peripheral Component Interconnect (PCI) expansion slots, and adding expansion cards.

To install the Wildcat 4110 video card:

- 1. Turn off power to the computer and to the monitor, and disconnect the cables from the computer.
- 2. Open the computer to gain access to the AGP Pro50 or AGP Pro expansion slot.




Figure 2. Internal VIO Connector (Wildcat 4110 VIO)

- 3. If you are removing a Wildcat 4110 VIO card, you may need to disconnect a ribbon cable from the internal VIO connector on the card (see Figure 2).
- 4. Remove the existing card, retaining the screws to use later.




Figure 3. Expansion Slot Connectors

- 5. Align the Wildcat 4110 card with the AGP Pro50 or AGP Pro expansion slot, as required. Make sure the gold-fingered connections on the card's edge are aligned properly with the slot connector (see Figure 3).
- 6. Push the card into the expansion slot firmly and evenly until it is fully seated in the slot connector.
- 7. Visually inspect the connection. If it does not appear to be correct, remove and reinstall the card.
- 8. If you are replacing a Wildcat 4110 VIO card, you may have to reconnect a ribbon cable to the internal VIO connector on the card (see Figure 2).
- 9. Secure the card to the chassis using the screws you removed previously.
- 10. Close the computer and reconnect the power cord. See "Connecting the Monitor" in this chapter for instructions on connecting a display device to the Wildcat 4110 video card.

Connecting the Monitor

To connect the monitor:

- 1. Make sure the power to the computer is turned off.




Figure 4. Analog Video Output

- 2. Connect the workstation monitor's video cable to the appropriate output port on the Wildcat 4110 video card. See the documentation that came with your monitor for information on the type of connection that is required. Typically, you will connect the monitor cable to the analog video output port (see Figure 4).

NOTE

If your monitor does not have a built-in video cable, use a shielded video cable with a 15-pin (D-sub) video connector at one end for the video output port on the card, and the appropriate connectors at the other end for the video input port on the monitor. See the documentation delivered with your monitor for more information.

3. Turn on power to the workstation. If the monitor's Power On LED does not illuminate or the monitor does not display the startup sequence, consult Chapter 4, "Troubleshooting."

NOTE If you installed the video card yourself, the computer will boot into VGA mode. Go to "Installing the Software" in this chapter for instructions on installing the video drivers.

NOTE See "Connecting a Stereo Display Device" in this chapter for instructions on connecting other devices to the video card.

Installing the Software

If you are installing a Wildcat 4110 video card or reinstalling its driver software, take the following steps. Refer to the Microsoft Windows NT documentation and online Help for more information on installing drivers and software application programs.

Make Sure Your Computer is Ready

Make sure your workstation has the following before installing Wildcat driver software:

- Microsoft Windows NT Workstation 4.0 operating system with Service Pack 4 (or later)
- ♦ 3MB of free space on the computer's primary system disk

CAUTION You must have the correct driver for the Windows NT 4.0 operating system. If you are unsure, refer to the README file on the driver delivery media for this information.

If you are reinstalling the Wildcat 4110 driver, you must first remove the currently installed driver.

To remove the existing Wildcat 4110 driver:

- 1. Log on to Windows NT using an account that has administrative privileges.
- 2. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Add/Remove Programs » Install/Uninstall.

- 3. Highlight the Display Driver and click Add/Remove.
- 4. When prompted to confirm driver removal, click Yes and follow the displayed prompts.

To install the Wildcat 4110 video driver:

- 1. Log on to Windows NT using an account that has administrative privileges.
- 2. Insert the delivery media into the appropriate device (for diskettes or CD).
- 3. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Settings » Display Type » Change.
- 4. In the Change Display dialog box, click Have Disk.
- 5. In the Install From Disk dialog box, type the path to the directory that contains the delivery media.
- 6. In the Change Display dialog box, verify that the Wildcat 4110 driver is highlighted, and then click OK.
- 7. When asked if you want to install a third-party driver, click Yes.
- 8. When a message displays that the driver installed successfully, click OK.
- 9. Click Close to exit the Display Type dialog box.
- 10. Click Close to exit the Display Properties dialog box.
- 11. When told that the workstation must be restarted for the new settings to take effect, remove the diskette from the workstation's floppy disk drive, if applicable, and click Yes.
- 12. After the system restarts and you log in, a message displays stating that a new display driver has been installed, and that you should use the Display option in the Control Panel to select the preferred display resolution. Click OK.

See Chapter 3, "Using the Video Card," for instructions on defining the display properties.

Verify the Default Video Display Driver

To verify the default video display driver:

- 1. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Settings » Display Type.
- 2. Verify that Wildcat 4110 is listed under Adapter Type.
- 3. Click Cancel to dismiss the Adapter Type list without making any changes.
- 4. Click Cancel to close the Display Properties dialog box.

Verify the System Startup Version

To verify the default system startup version:

1. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » System » Startup/Shutdown.

2. If Windows NT Workstation Version 4.x is not selected, select it and click Apply.

NOTE Do not select the VGA version of the operating system. The video display runs in VGA mode when the Wildcat 4110 graphics driver is not running.

3. Click OK to close the System dialog box.

Check the Video Image

To check the video image:

- 1. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Settings.
- 2. Click Test to test the display resolution.
- 3. Click OK to dismiss the Display Properties dialog box.

See Chapter 3, "Using the Video Card," for instructions on defining the display properties.

Connecting a Stereo Display Device

The following instructions apply only if you are connecting a stereo video display device to the Wildcat 4110 video card.

To connect a stereo display device:

1. Connect one end of the stereo emitter cable to the input port on your stereoscopic display device.

NOTE See the documentation delivered with your stereoscopic display device for information on the connectors and proper cables.




Figure 5. Stereo Output Port

- 2. Connect the other end of the stereo emitter cable to the stereo output port on the Wildcat 4110 video card (see Figure 5).
- 3. Configure the display settings to enable stereo display. See Chapter 3, "Using the Video Card," for step-by-step instructions.

3 Using the Video Card

This chapter contains instructions for configuring the video display and enabling the stereo display.

NOTE

If you ordered this video card with a system, it was configured for use prior to shipment. The following instructions apply only if you purchased the card as an upgrade or add-on.

Configuring the Video Display

Once the drivers are installed properly, the Display Properties dialog box will have two additional tabs: Wildcat Configuration and Wildcat Monitor.

To use the Wildcat Configuration tab:

- 1. Make sure you are logged into the non-VGA version of Windows NT.
- 2. Close any open applications.
- 3. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Wildcat Configuration (see Figure 6).
- 4. On the Wildcat Configuration tab, click Hardware Information to view current hardware settings; click View Configuration to view the current display configuration; or click Configuration Wizard to modify the current display configuration or create a new one.

To use the Wildcat Monitor tab:

- Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Wildcat Configuration (see Figure 7).
- 2. On the Wildcat Monitor tab, you can adjust the resolution, color depth, and refresh rate.

- Click Color Calibration to change the color settings. Make changes, and then click OK to accept
 the changes and dismiss the Color Calibration dialog box, or click Cancel to close the Color
 Calibration dialog box without making any changes. You are returned to the Wildcat Monitor
 Display Properties dialog box.
- 4. On the Wildcat Monitor Display Properties dialog box, click Configure Monitor to change the display mode, select a monitor type, and change the resolution/refresh rate. Once you have made the changes you require, click OK to accept the new configuration and dismiss the Configure Monitor dialog box. You are returned to the Wildcat Monitor Display Properties dialog box.
- 5. Click OK on the Display Properties dialog box to accept the changes, or click Cancel to close the dialog box without accepting any modifications.
- 6. Restart the workstation if you are prompted to do so. Most changes will take effect without restarting.

NOTE See Appendix A, "Technical Information," for a list of available monitor resolutions.

NOTE See "Enabling Stereo Display," for instructions on changing the Display Mode.

Enabling Stereo Display

If you connect a device to the stereo port on the Wildcat 4110 card, you must change the display mode to view in stereo. See Chapter 2, "Setup," for the location of the stereo output port.

NOTE

The Display Properties dialog box must be displayed. See "Configuring the Video Display" in this chapter for instructions on activating the Display Properties dialog box and selecting the Wildcat Monitor tab.

To enable stereo display:

- 1. Make sure your stereo display device is properly connected to the stereo output port on the Wildcat 4110 card. See Chapter 2, "Setup," for more information.
- 2. On the Wildcat Monitor tab under Display Properties, click Configure Monitor. The Configure Monitor dialog box displays.
- 3. Select one of the Stereoscopic Display modes from the Display Mode pulldown, then click OK. You are returned to the Display Properties dialog box.
- 4. If you are prompted with the following message: "The selected monitor cannot display the current desktop area. Select a new resolution before applying these changes," click OK then select a resolution from the list of available resolutions.
- 5. Click OK if the display is correct and you wish to keep the new settings. The Display Properties dialog box is dismissed.
- 6. Click OK to accept the new display mode and dismiss the Display Properties dialog box.

NOTE

You must disable stereo mode when you no longer wish to view in stereo. Follow the steps above, and select Monoscopic Display under Display Mode to disable stereo mode.

4 Troubleshooting

This chapter describes common problems and solutions, how to get a usable video resolution, how to reinstall the video driver software, and how to get help.

Common Problems and Solutions

Monitor Checks

Problem	Cause	Solution
Display is black, not synchronized, or distorted	Display properties are not set correctly.	Use the Last Known Good option, or restart Windows NT in VGA mode and select a supported resolution and refresh rate. Instructions for both of these solutions are provided later in this chapter.
Monitor does not support a selected resolution or refresh rate	The selected settings are not compatible with your monitor and video card.	Restart Windows NT in VGA mode and select a supported resolution and refresh rate.
		Reinstall the video driver.
There is no VGA boot screen	The connections may not be set up properly.	Verify that the monitor cable is securely fastened to the video card.
		Make sure the monitor and computer are plugged into electrical outlets and are receiving power.
		Check any other external display connectors, if applicable.
		Verify that the video card is seated properly in its expansion slot.
Screen image is off-center	Monitor settings may be configured improperly.	Refer to your monitor's documentation for instructions on making horizontal and vertical adjustments.

Problem	Cause	Solution
Color balance is wrong	Monitor settings may be configured improperly.	Refer to your monitor's documentation for instructions on adjusting the color display.
There is no picture	Improper software setup or hardware problem.	Verify that the display properties are configured correctly for the monitor type. If the software setup is correct, use a similar type monitor (if available and functioning properly) to determine if the workstation is defective. See "Obtaining a Usable Video Resolution" in this chapter for instructions on determining if you have a defective unit.
Screen image defects appear	Possible indication of a hardware problem.	Run diagnostics to check the graphics hardware.

Diagnostics

Diagnostics utilities for checking the video card and instructions for using these utilities may be available from your computer vendor.

Getting a Usable Video Resolution

The system operates in VGA mode when the video display driver is not running to accommodate all monitor types. VGA mode is used during initial installation of the video display driver and when experiencing video problems. If you select a resolution that causes the monitor to display incorrectly, press CTRL+ALT+DEL but do not log on to the Windows NT operating system. Instead, shut down then use the Last Known Good option to return to the last known good configuration recorded by Windows NT.

Last Known Good Option

To use the last known good option:

- 1. Restart the system.
- 2. Press the space bar when prompted to invoke the Last Known Good menu.

If this option fails to correct the video display problem, restart the system in VGA mode and reconfigure your display to 640 x 480 resolution, 60 Hz refresh rate. Then restart Windows NT again in non-VGA mode.

Restarting the System in VGA Mode

To restart in VGA mode:

- 1. Restart the system.
- 2. At the boot screen, select the VGA version of the operating system.

Determining a Defective Unit

To determine a defective unit:

- 1. Save and exit from all files, if possible, then shut down Windows NT.
- 2. Turn off the power to the monitor and to the system.

WARNING Always turn off the power to the system before connecting or disconnecting the cables.

- 3. Check and reseat all card and cable connections as needed.
- 4. Turn on the monitor power. If the Power On LED does not illuminate, see Getting Help in this section.
- 5. Turn on the power to the system base unit. If the Power On LED on the base unit does not illuminate, or if the BIOS beep codes indicate a failure, see Getting Help in this section.

Reinstalling the Video Driver

Refer to the Microsoft Windows NT documentation and online Help for more information on installing drivers and software application programs.

CAUTION You must have the correct driver for the Windows NT 4.0 operating system. If you are unsure, refer to the README file on the driver delivery media for this information.

If you are reinstalling the Wildcat 4110 driver, you must remove the current driver prior to installing the update.

To remove the existing Wildcat 4110 driver:

- 1. Log on to Windows NT using an account that has administrative privileges.
- 2. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Add/Remove Programs » Install/Uninstall.
- 3. On the Install/Uninstall tab, highlight the Intense3D Display Driver and click Add/Remove.

- 4. When prompted to confirm driver removal, click Yes and follow the prompts.
- 5. On the Install/Uninstall tab, highlight the Intense3D Display Driver and click Add/Remove.
- 6. When prompted to confirm driver removal, click Yes and follow the prompts.

To reinstall the video driver:

- 1. Log on to Windows NT using an account that has administrative privileges.
- 2. Insert the delivery media into the appropriate device (for diskettes or CD).
- 3. Go to Start » Settings » Control Panel » Display » Settings » Display Type » Change.
- 4. In the Change Display dialog box, click Have Disk.
- 5. In the Install From Disk dialog box, type the path to the directory that contains the delivery media.
- 6. In the Change Display dialog box, verify that the Wildcat 4110 driver is highlighted, and then click OK.
- 7. When asked if you want to install a third-party driver, click Yes.
- 8. When a message displays that the driver installed successfully, click OK.
- 9. Click Close to exit the Display Type dialog box.
- 10. Click Close to exit the Display Properties dialog box.
- 11. When told that the workstation must be restarted for the new settings to take effect, remove the diskette from the workstation's floppy disk drive, if applicable, and then click Yes.




Figure 8. Bottom View




Figure 9. Top View




Figure 10. External Ports

Stereo Sync Output

The stereo port (female, 3-pin, mini-DIN connector) provides connection to a LCD shutter glasses emitter module or to other stereo shutter devices.

Analog Video Output

The video port (female, 15-pin, D-SUB connector) provides connection to an analog CRT display.

DVI-I Output

The Digital Video Output Port uses a DVI-I receptacle with 29 signal contacts as specified by the Digital Visual Interface Revision 1.0 specification. This port supports pixel rates up to 112 MHz using the SII150A PanelLink device from Silicon Image. The port is 100 percent compliant to the DVI specification, and supports digital and analog displays.




Figure 11. Internal VIO Connector (Wildcat 4110 VIO)

VIO (Wildcat 4110 VIO)

The internal VIO connector on a Wildcat 4110 VIO card provides a path for direct image and alpha channel data transfer to and from the card's frame buffers.
